



Update on buses stopping in Yarpole



Pete Lloyd has had disappointing news from the transport Services Manager. As Pete says "They don't seem to realise that we don't want to walk up or down an increasingly dangerous unrestricted single track lane from Bircher Turn which is being recognised and increasingly used by speeding traffic as a Leominster by-pass to the North and South". The response is printed below:

Good morning Maggie,

Apologies for the delay in a response.

Herefordshire Council, in consultation with Lugg Valley Travel, has considered your request and would make the following points:

- We do not believe that re-routeing all service 490 journeys via Yarpole would generate enough passengers to justify the extra mileage (and cost) and the time penalties in completely overhauling the timetable.
- Even if an additional 20 passengers were to travel at least twice a week each this would average out at below 1 passenger per journey
- The existing 489 service on Tuesdays and Fridays gives a 'shopping' service into Leominster from Yarpole but is very poorly used by Yarpole residents. In the second half of 2022, only 7 passengers were recorded making trips into Leominster on a total of 52 journeys (1 pass holder x4 journeys, 1 pass holder x2 journey and 1 fare paying passenger).
- As a comparison, during the same period (second half of 2022) 27 passengers boarded the Wednesdays only 498 service in Yarpole giving an average of 1 per journey travelling to Hereford

I regret that having taken into account the above, we are unable to agree to re-routing all 489 journeys via Yarpole village.



Yarpole Group Parish Council September 2023



In July John Cadwallader was co-opted as Councillor for Croft with Yarpole and welcomed by the Parish Council.

Community Meadow. New benches have been treated with preservative and fixed in place at the meadow. Thanks are due to Cllr Andrew Daniels for co-ordinating and completing these tasks, and to residents and Cllr Cadwallader for their invaluable assistance.

Dog faeces were discussed. It is imperative that residents can use the meadow for play, picnics, and other recreational activity without the fear of contamination. The bin is provided for users of the meadow but had again been filled by one person emptying a carrier bag of faeces. If all faeces are not picked up and disposed of, options will be considered including potentially removing the dog bin, requiring dogs to be kept on a lead, or only allowing dogs on the public right of way.

The Parish Council is in correspondence with **Welsh Water** about poor management in Yarpole village. It has also received correspondence from **The National Trust** about Bircher Common. See separate article below.

Public Rights of Way. The Footpaths Officer's offer to strim certain public rights of way on a voluntary basis was accepted, and a new suitable strimmer purchased. The Officer is thanked for his voluntary contributions to the Parishes. It was agreed at the August meeting to install a new gate on the YP7 path replacing one damaged beyond repair.

Planning Applications.

The Parish Council objected to P232103/F - Planning Permission. Land at Leys Lane Bircher HR6 0AY. Proposed erection of 1 no. dwelling with associated development, including access, parking and landscaping (Re-submission of refused application 222800). The Parish Council's concerns included the risk of runoff exacerbating potential flooding of an existing property and poor vehicular access. It was agreed the proposal is contrary to the Neighbourhood Development Plan policies YG3 (a) and YG4 (d).

No objections were raised regarding applications P232028/FH - Full Householder. Steps Cottage, Green Lane, Yarpole HR6 0BD. Demolition of single storey building (former post office) and proposed two storey extension. Replace existing windows and re-render existing external walls, or P232050/FH - Full Householder Brookside Cottage, Yarpole HR6 0BA. Proposed first floor dormer bedroom extension.

The next scheduled meetings are on Tuesday 5 September and Tuesday 3 October, 7.30pm at the Parish Hall. Residents are invited to attend.

Letter from The National Trust (of particular interest to residents at Bircher)

The Parish Council has received a lengthy letter from the National Trust, in response to ours. In this letter, Ben Shipston states that there is not, as yet, a final management plan for Bircher Common. The next iteration, once finalized, will be circulated for consultation. He also clarifies that there are no proposals to fence off parts of the common

and that the Trust has not seen a copy of the agreement between Lord Croft and the Graziers Association (GA). He asks that the GA share their copy of the agreement with the Trust as soon as possible. It is of concern to the Trust that there is no central data base containing an accurate list of the rights held by each party. Mr Shipston notes that there have been no responses to the concerns raised by Trust staff about livestock numbers and leasing rights which leads him to assume the GA is no longer in existence. The Trust is concerned that some graziers have exceeded their rights and would welcome the establishment of a forum to resolve concerns. No licence has been given to train horses. One individual has been granted rights to exercise horses due the nature of their business being commercial. The Trust is aware that many riders exercise their horses on the estate on an informal basis, there being no bridle ways. The Trust is considering introducing a licencing system for all horse riding. At present they are monitoring existing licences and will act if concerns arise.

Achievement – One of the things I have done as part of my study leave is to walk the Pembrokeshire Coastal Path. I have wanted to do this since I was in my late teens. I actually did around a third of it back in 1986 and have done different parts ever since but never got around to walking the whole path. I can now say that after walking for 16 days I have completed all 186 miles and enjoyed every moment of it! Whilst written out it does not seem quite so challenging, as it was coastal walking it certainly contained a lot of climbing up and down. According to the Coast Path, guide book the ascents and descent are said to be the equivalent of climbing Mount Everest – 35,000 feet! In addition I lost weight and raised with my sister in law £3000 for the Alzheimer's Society. It actually feels like I have achieved something and it got me thinking about the idea of success.

In our society today, we are often measured by how successful we are and whilst we should all aim to do our best and work hard that will not always lead to success. It is so easy for us to try to emulate others or to search out the golden bullet that will change our fortunes but the reality is chasing after superficial success will not help us spiritually.

The same is true in our churches; it is far too easy to compare ourselves with others or think that there is a clever solution to our problems. The reality is there is no one way to grow our churches or to be successful because it is God who grows the church not us. When we chase after clever tools and copy other peoples' strategies we miss the point completely.

"Come now, you who say,"Today or tomorrow we will go into such and such a town and spend a year there and trade and make a profit"—yet you do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes. Instead you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we will live and do this or that."As it is, you boast in your arrogance. All such boasting is evil. So whoever knows the right thing to do and fails to do it, for him it is sin." James 4:13-17

James writing to the early church recognised that it is only God who can create our spiritual growth and grand plans that don't include God are fruitless. When we chase success for success' sake we will simply end up missing what God is about and fool ourselves. James isn't suggesting we have a fatalistic faith but what he is saying is that we need to see what God is doing amongst us and join in with him. So often, we create plans and then invite God to bless them rather than asking God in prayer what he would have us do. James wants the church to be a place that is faithful to the gospel and to listen to God and not chase after success and achievement so we can boast about ourselves. When we put God first in our lives then we will see achievement in a different light.

Achievement also does not come without cost and it amazes me how so often we stockpile our resources and then wonder why we don't see more fruit from our church life. Generosity and hospitality are core parts of our faith and yet we often fail to share what God has given us with others. If we truly want to see our churches grow and flourish we have to live out the values of our faith and not allow ourselves to become inward looking. Our faith is not a business transaction where we get what we pay for instead we are called to give ourselves away for the sake of the kingdom. This is what Jesus taught his disciples and it is just as true for us today.

"Don't pile up treasures on earth, where moth and rust can spoil them and thieves can break in and steal. But keep your treasure in Heaven where there is neither moth nor rust to spoil it and nobody can break in and steal. For wherever your treasure is, you may be certain that your heart will be there too!" Matthew 6:19-21

The good news is that we can all achieve things for God if we put our minds to it and he has given us all the resources we need if we put our trust in him. It doesn't matter if we are part of a church with six members or sixty we all have a part in God's plan if we ask him and listen for the whispers of the Holy Spirit to guide us. Instead of trying to be successful, we need to learn to be faithful and obedient to the call of God to serve our communities. I love the words of the Missionary teacher William Carey that remind us to trust God and have a go!

"Expect great things from God. Attempt great things for God."

Restoring Yarpole Wildflower Meadows

Have you heard of B-lines? They're a series of 'insect pathways' running through the UK being created by a charity called Buglife. In Herefordshire, Buglife is working with local wildflower charity Herefordshire Meadows to create a series of wildflower-rich corridors that will form a network of insect-friendly habitats across the landscape. We applied to have our fields included in the project and were accepted. Now we're looking for people who can help us sow the seed: can you help?

Some of the seed will come from our own wildflower orchard, and Herefordshire Meadows will supply us with additional seed taken from local wildflower meadows. Sowing will take place on the afternoon of either Wednesday 27^{th} or Thursday 28^{th} September, depending on the weather. Herefordshire Meadows staff will be there to organise and instruct us, so no knowledge or experience is required. 

LIFE CYCLE OF A QUEEN BEE

Due to the inclement weather during the month of July, I have very little news from the apiary except for Hive no.5, to as mentioned in the May issue, which had killed the Buckfast Queen I kindly bought them last autumn, (£50.00 thank you very much girls), and were therefore queenless. Well they have finally produced a queen.



So, in light of the lack of news from the apiary I thought I would take the opportunity of explaining a little bit about the queen bee as she is so vital to the survival of a colony.

The queen bee is the mother of all the bees in her hive. She is the only bee in the hive that lays eggs and is responsible for both the worker bees, (females), the drones, (male bees), and ironically her successor, the queen.

Genetically the worker bee and queen bee are identical. Any fertilized egg, (worker bee), has the potential to be a queen, the only thing that differentiates them from one another is the queen's diet. All larvae are fed royal jelly for the first three days, thereafter they are fed on a mixture of pollen and nectar. However, it's the job of the nurse bees, between the age of 6 and 12 days to choose as many as 20 newly hatched eggs and feed them <u>exclusively</u> on royal jelly. Royal jelly is a substance produced by the nurse bees, from the **hypopharangeal** glands on the sides of their heads. It's a milky white substance made up of 67% water, protein, simple sugars, fatty acids and vitamins including B5, B6 and C.

Queen bees have the shortest development period of any of the other bees in the colony. Once a queen cup has been developed and an egg is present, nurse bees will begin to draw out the comb to about 25mm in length to give the queen larvae room to grow. Nine days after the egg has been laid, the developing queen cell is capped. The larvae spins a cocoon and pupates and the developed queen emerges after 16 days.

With multiple queen cells in the colony, the first queen to emerge from her cell will, on day one, signal her arrival, by making a loud tooting sound. The unborn queens make a gurgling sound and the emerged queen seeks out her rivals and kills them using her sting, which unlike the worker bees is not barbed and therefore she can use it multiple times. (She only uses her sting on rival queens). If she misses any they will fight until only one remains.

Between the 3rd and 5th day she goes on orientation flights to make sure of the exact position of her hive. From 1st to 3rd week she goes on multiple mating flights, leaving the hive in search of a drone congregation area. Hundreds of drones gather together, in the sky, to mate with the queen, and typically they only congregate on sunny days and near their colonies! The queen, however, will fly for 2 - 3 miles in search of suitable mating partners. Honeybees only mate in the air; never on the ground or in the hive. She will only mate with about 10 to 20 drones who will die straight after.

Three to four days after mating the queen starts to lay. She lays up to 2,000 eggs a day, surrounded by her attendants who tend to her every need, and she produces the pheromones that unite and guide her entire colony. She will not leave the hive again and will remain there for four or five years, or until the colony swarms or she dies.

Such is the life and importance of the queen bee!

The Day I drank from the dirtiest glass in the world

It wasn't done for a bet, nor would I have chosen to drink from it if there was an alternative, but I was a bit stuck.

Many years ago I went to France in the hope of learning more about my two hobbies – eating and drinking – and found a farmhouse in the Bordeaux region. I would pick grapes, see the winemaking process first hand, and simultaneously learn the secrets of real French farmhouse cooking. What better combination?

If there is a reason why bunches of grapes hang at the most awkward level for picking, I don't know it; too high if you are kneeling on the ground, too low if you are standing up. The only way to snip them is to stoop with a bent back whilst carrying a plastic hod on your shoulders into which to throw the grapes, which naturally becomes heavier by the minute. This was from 8 in the morning till 6 in the evening, with a one hour lunch break. After the first week I believe I would have found life in a Siberian labour camp a doddle.

Sadly this particular farmhouse was probably the only one in France (at least I hope it was) where the farmer's wife never cooked a thing. She just opened tins: a daily ration of gin may have had something to do with it. Coupled with the aforementioned workout, this meant that a glass of house wine was a very welcome accompaniment to lunch. I say glass, in fact we drank a litre of wine each, every lunchtime. It was only 11° I kept telling myself, so it wasn't doing any harm; in fact, since it made the afternoons bearable, it was actually doing some good.

I don't know how well the farmer rated his own *vin de table*, but he had a very high opinion of the small quantity of sweet white wine he made each year, as a sideline just for his own consumption. Since I had distinguished myself slightly by being able to interpret between the household and my non-French-speaking fellow pickers, I was eventually considered, after about four weeks, sufficiently worthy of a sip of the golden nectar.

Uncorking a brown litre-bottle from a corner of the press house, he searched round for a glass, and saw a tumbler on a windowsill, covered in cobwebs and containing a few dead flies. That may indicate how often he shared his treasure. He tipped out some of the contents, wiped a greasy oil-smeared finger round the inside – he had just been mending the tractor – poured in a drop and held it out proudly for me to taste. Like I said, had there been an alternative ... But could I refuse the privilege? I felt I was doing this for England. To its credit, it tasted of wine, which surprised me in the circumstances, and I duly showered just enough praise on it, without it sounding as if I wanted more.

Believe it or not, that wasn't the worst the thing about cleanliness on the, oh, I've run out of space. Another time ...
