





#### **Bonfire laws in England & Wales**

The law on domestic bonfires in England and Wales is very simple: there isn't one; there is, however, a law against any subsequent nuisance that having one might cause. As the Government puts it:

You can't get rid of household waste if it will cause pollution or harm people's health. This includes burning it.

However, the legal principle is that any nuisance must usually happen on a regular basis to be considered so.

Your council can issue an 'abatement notice' if a neighbour's bonfire is causing a nuisance. A bonfire must happen frequently to be considered a nuisance.

So, the occasional bonfire should be fine and you abide by the following two points:

You must make sure that the smoke from your bonfire doesn't blow across a road and so cause danger to the traffic on it.

You don't burn anything that could cause pollution or harm to public health. That rules out burning anything like plastic, rubber, old engine oil, and anything else that might produce poisonous fumes. Burning stuff like this won't just harm your health and that of anyone else around you, it is also likely to be a criminal offence.

A bonfire can be an environmentally sound way of getting rid of garden material. Of course it's better to compost vegetative waste where you can, but as long your fire is carefully planned the result is carbon-neutral waste disposal, which isn't something that can be said of hauling it to the tip in your car or having the council collect it in a truck.

#### Stamps are up.

As you will have seen in the news recently the Royal Mail is changing the price of some stamps on the 2nd October:

First class stamps will be £1.25, up from £1.10, and first class large will go up from £1.60 to £1.95.

Second class large will be £1.55, up from £1.15, but second class ordinary stamps will remain at 75p.

Existing barcoded stamps will remain valid - so maybe don't miss out on the stamp hoarding opportunity and stock up at the current price to beat the increase!

#### Return to sender

Remember the Post Office does process Amazon returns, as well as those for other companies, and every transaction we do benefits the shop through the PO Renumeration scheme. So do remember us when you are returning items - but also remember that we don't offer a wrapping service here as we have limited space, so all items must be wrapped ready to post. We will do the rest!

#### **Snuffling time**

With Autumn coughs and colds returning we are well stocked with over-the-counter remedies - as well as tissues and hand wipes!

Warming soups are easily made with our range of lentils and vegetables and should you feel of a mind to make All Souls Cakes on the 31st (a traditional treat which is a delicious halfway house between a cake and a biscuit, filled with currants and mixed spice) then pop into the shop to pick up a recipe and the requisite ingredients!

A big thank you to the Men's Shed group for, appropriately enough, the excellent new roof on the storage shed behind the church.

#### Cash is still cool!

It seems some people may have read the item in the last Parishioner about paying off account balances using BACS as meaning we no longer accepted cash.

#### **CHURCH MATTERS**

#### October 2023

October brings us fully into Autumn. The beginning of this month is the Jewish feast of Succoth (Tabernacles) which is the final CROFT WITH YARPOLE harvest celebration of the biblical feasts. After the disruption of Covid, we are now able to resume our own harvest thanksgiving with a service on the afternoon of the 8<sup>th</sup> October. See the separate notice below.

Right at the beginning of November are All Saints and All Souls days, and on All Souls day, the 2<sup>nd</sup> November, we will have a time of remembrance for those who have died. Again, see the separate notice on the next page.

We continue with our Be Still times on the first Wednesday of each month, as a time to just sit in silence (surprisingly difficult!) and meditate on some reading, sometimes with some gentle music.

The House Church meetings on Tuesday evenings will not continue this autumn. Instead we are suggesting that people attend Marion Forrester's series on prayer, that begins on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> September at Orleton Church. See the notice outside the church.

At Croft, we managed, with some ingenuity, to remove the ancient cobwebs from the roof. There will be a lunchtime concert there on 19<sup>th</sup> October by pupils of Lucton School; see the events page of the Yarpole website for further details. For advance warning, in November the *Made in HR6* craft fair will be held in Yarpole church on the weekend of 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> and so the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday service of November will be in Croft instead of Yarpole.

The Feast of Tabernacles, which I mentioned above, is the third of the third set of the biblical feasts. The feasts all have prophetic meaning. The spring feasts, which are Passover, Unleavened Bread and First Fruits, were all fulfilled by Jesus in his first coming. The second, the Feast of Weeks, which for us is called Pentecost or Whitsun, was fulfilled by the coming of the Holy Spirit on the church. The final set, which are the Feast of Trumpets, the Day of Atonement and the Feast of Tabernacles, will all be fulfilled in the time of Jesus's second coming, when He will return to set up his kingdom over the whole earth. This will be God's harvest time to bring in to himself all who belong to him.

Following the service, we invite you to join us for refreshments where there will be an opportunity for you to share with us how the church can better meet your needs.




#### Tea, cake, entertainment – and a chance to meet the team

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#### **Yarpole Group Parish Council October 2023**



14 members of the public were welcomed to the September meeting. Councillors agreed to write to Planning Enforcement at Herefordshire Council about potential planning breaches at the development *Land Adjacent to Maunds House P160075/F*. The interruption to the electricity supply, disconnected due to the development's proximity to an 11,000-v supply line, was discussed. Updates and information received by the Parish Council will be posted as News items on its

Concerns were raised about bonfires. On sunny days smoke forces residents to take in their washing and retreat indoors, and, even with windows shut, the smell of smoke pervades. At night, smoke from smouldering fires is detrimental to those sleeping with windows open. They pose a fire risk. In Lucton the Fire Brigade was called out recently due to out-of-control bonfires. Please be considerate if lighting a bonfire. You could dispose of waste through the Biffa Green Waste scheme, through composting or at the Leominster recycling centre.

A letter drafted by the Welsh Water Working Group has been sent to Mr Steve Wilson, Managing Director for Wastewater Services seeking a resolution to the longstanding sewage problems in the village.

Thanks were recorded for three generous donations to the Parish Council. £1,000 from Mr and Mrs Clive Sheridan and £100 from Mr William Daniels will help fund a seesaw for the Community Meadow, and £354 from Cllr Audrey Bott will fund a bench at the Meadow. The picnic table, funded by a grant of £452 from The Yarpole Community Shop, is proving to be a great benefit to residents, and is being well used.

A new volunteer Tree Warden was appointed and welcomed. The Warden can be contacted via the Clerk.

A decision was taken to remove the dog waste bin at The Community Meadow due to its misuse. The bin is regularly overfilled causing unpleasant odours, and the expense of having it emptied every week, rather than fortnightly, is too high. The children's play area will be more pleasant without a dog bin close by. A notice will be put up, and dog owners are asked to take faeces home or use the bin on the corner of Green Lane.

Four residents have volunteered to help plant trees, shrubs, and hedges at the Meadow. If you are interested in joining in, please contact the Clerk.

The new post and handrail at the Community Meadow steps was hit by a vehicle and damaged beyond repair. It has been removed.

The Parish Council would be grateful if all homeowners and landowners could arrange to have hedges on their boundaries cut back so that pedestrians can safely use the pavement and not have to step into the road.

Upcoming meeting dates Tuesdays 3 October, 7 November, and 5 December. There is no scheduled meeting in January 2024. Residents are encouraged to attend and can speak at the start of the meeting.

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

#### ON BEING STUCK BEHIND A TRACTOR!

Hoorah!! It is harvest time again!! There you are, hurtling through the lanes in your car on some mission of huge national importance, muttering venomously at cyclists in helmets shaped like wasps' bottoms, inconsiderate enough to want a bit of your road, rounding a bend and coming up behind the ponderous majesty of a tractor and trailer. On closer inspection over the next ten minutes you conclude that it is actually a convoy of three tractors and two trailers and the glory of the aforementioned ponderous majesty begins to wear a bit thin! Hoorah! It is harvest time again. And I would wager a considerable sum that most of you do not at this point start singing songs of everlasting thanks and praise to our great God for his generous provision, or blessing the farmers for the work they do to put food on our plates!

So here is your challenge for harvest and beyond. I've learned to do it and if I can manage it anyone can. If you get stuck on your travels behind a tractor or a combine or a plough or any other mysteriously shaped implement of the sod, (by which I mean, of course, the soil!) take it as an opportunity for reflection, for thanksgiving and for praise.

Why should you bother? ## THE CURIOUS GARDENER Edible trombones

Last Christmas my nephew gave us a packet of Tromboncino courgette seeds. In a fit of enthusiasm I sowed the whole packet and was rewarded with more than a dozen stout plants. They looked so strong and willing that I was tempted to plant half a dozen or so in the greenhouse, but by the time I'd put in the tomatoes, the bush courgettes and the basil there wasn't very much space left so I settled for planting just one.

Thank heavens I didn't plant more. The Tromboncino didn't pause for breath: it took off like a whippet, filling the space allotted to it in no time flat. By June it was climbing along the roof struts and was 15' across. By July it had started growing in the opposite direction as well and was weaving its way through the tomatoes. I couldn't believe the number of fruits it produced. It carried up to 20 at a time, in all sorts of configurations: the ones dangling down from the roof were straight like shillelaghs, whereas those forming in more constricted spaces curled themselves round into hoops. Their ability to grow bigger seemed unlimited. Peter picked some one evening and put their ends in water to keep them fresh, and blow me - they grew overnight. The book said they are edible at any length up to three feet, but even a relatively modest two foot's worth of Tromboncino is enough to feed a large family.

I don't think we've ever had so much fun from a packet of seeds. If you fancy growing something different I can thoroughly recommend them: just don't plant more than one.

Hello everyone! Welcome to a new edition of 'Lisa's Book Nook'. A few months ago, I recommended some books about King Richard III, and that provided me with inspiration for this month's theme. I am therefore going to recommend a few non-fiction books to you. Not only that, but they are also all about the medieval period in one way or another. I hope you enjoy them.

The Red Prince: The Life of John of Gaunt, the Duke of Lancaster by Helen Carr—This beautifully written biography tells the life story of John of Gaunt, a man whose name will no doubt be familiar to a lot of you, but whose story is not as well-known as you might initially think. Using meticulous research, Helen Carr delves deep into the life of this most intriguing historical figure, a man who, unfortunately, has built up a somewhat negative reputation over the centuries. What emerges from the pages is a fully fleshed out individual, who is placed firmly into the context of his time. By understanding the world in which John of Gaunt lived, as well as the people who surrounded him, the reader is able to start viewing him as a real human being, and a lot of the myths surrounding him get busted as a result. A particular highlight of this book is the exploration of John's relationship with his eldest brother, Edward of Woodstock, now forever known to history as the Black Prince. Their relationship was a refreshingly positive one and went a long way to shaping the man that John of Gaunt became. If you want an entertaining biography that will teach you some things that you didn't already know, please give this a try. You won't be disappointed.

The Time Traveller's Guide to Medieval England by Ian Mortimer - If you have ever wondered what life in 14<sup>th</sup> century England would look like, this is the book for you. Written in the form of a travel guide by acclaimed historian Ian Mortimer, this takes you on a deep dive into daily life in the latter part of the medieval period. There is a lot of information contained within its pages, but Mortimer writes in such a way that it never becomes dry, and you never feel overloaded. What is particularly enjoyable about this book is that it puts the common people into the spotlight, and seeing as a lot of books tend to overlook them, this makes for a refreshing change. Entertaining from the very first page, this is a compelling and novel way to connect with the past. Also, if you enjoy this book, you will be pleased to hear there are two more books in this vein, which cover Elizabethan and Restoration England.

Edward II: The Unconventional King by Kathryn Warner - Edward II is not a man you associate with good medieval kingship. After all, this was an individual who drove his kingdom to the brink of civil war numerous times in less than twenty years, led his army to one of the most humiliating defeats in their history, relied heavily on hugely unpopular male favourites and was eventually forced to abdicate by his scorned wife Isabella and her lover Roger Mortimer. On paper, he was one of the worst kings this country has ever seen. But was he really as awful as the history books suggest? Is there more to this story than we have previously been told? These questions, and more, are what this book sets out to address. Using mostly fourteenth century sources, Kathryn Warner provides a vivid, thoughtful and balanced re-evaluation of a deeply flawed man who has been somewhat demonised in the centuries following his death. She also dispels some of the myths that have built up around him, including the infamous "red hot poker" incident. If you are looking for a book that provides a fresh take on a well-known historical figure, this is a very good place to start.

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#### The Day I came clean

That I drank from the dirtiest glass in the world was shocking (see last issue). But it was hardly surprising in the context.

I'm sure it is how people (not just in France) lived for centuries: without washing. This farming family merely continued the tradition because there didn't seem any reason to change. In the vineyard, I knew when any one of them was within three or four rows of vines. My nose told me; yes, I do have conversations with it now and again, we keep in touch.

Since they didn't need soap and water, why would we, the pickers? Imagine you have spent a day in the hot sun, your hands and face sticky from grape juice, your smelly feet kicking up a coating of dust, sweat adding to the mix. Then imagine doing it for a week. You'd probably want a shower, right?

Sadly, it was an alien concept on the farm. Like anyone outside this family, I like to keep reasonably clean, nearer the godliness end of the spectrum as it were. What we had in place of a well-furnished shower cubicle was a cold tap on an outside wall in the farmyard, about the same height as a bunch of grapes (see last issue). That was it. No warm water, no soap. We could rinse our lower legs and feet, but anything else was challenging. We may have had a communal towel, if memory serves; but, like the single bedsheet each of us was issued for the five-week duration, its usefulness was limited.

Thankfully it took only a modicum of ingenuity to nick a length of hosepipe from the press house, find a watering can rose to attach to one end, then engineer a hook just above head height to sling it over and, as the French say, *voilà!* It was still a bit awkward with a mixed crew taking turns, and it had to be done in the evenings after work, outdoors, well into November. But given the chill, it meant that 7 or 8 people got the business over in about 20 minutes.

Despite all this, I'm sure our olfactory profile began to resemble that of the family by the end of five weeks, although it was difficult to tell: we had become so accustomed to the pong we could no longer discern the origin.

Our final afternoon in the vineyard was marked by a celebratory piece of cake (bought specially for the occasion, certainly not home-made, see last issue), a glass of fizzy wine (likewise) and the realisation that we were free to go. Bed and board had been deducted from our meagre wages, so none of us made any money out of it, but on the plus side it was unforgettable.

I drove away wondering if any hostelry would take me in – one smell and they'd suddenly be fully booked – but I found a cheap pension somewhere and proceeded to luxuriate in the best warm soapy bath I have ever had, bar none. Me and my nose slept soundly that night.
