

The evening will include Mozart's Ave Verum and Sancta Maria, and an orchestra performance of Eine Kleine Nachtmusik.

The Requiem in D minor was his final work - he died before completing it. He was only 35. Mozart's Requiem is a choral masterpiece written for a patron who had lost his young wife to illness earlier in 1791. But after his death, his widow, Constanze claimed that throughout Mozart's last painful days he believed he was writing the Requiem for his own funeral. And he was! Even though it had to be completed by his contemporaries, the circumstances of the composition, combined with Mozart's genius, make it no ordinary piece of music.

Firstly, this is not something I have done before, it is voluntary, I am by no means the expert but I will do my best. I do know my Sweet Chestnut from a Horse Chestnut but I look forward to expanding my knowledge meeting the other tree wardens and attending some training sessions.

The role is an evolving one. I have very much got to work out what I should be doing or indeed what I can do to enhance the love of trees in others.

At the moment I have been asked by the Parish Council to comment on any planning applications concerning trees in our conservation areas. If you have put in an application, I will try to pop round for a chat and view the tree.

There are about 500 Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs) in Herefordshire, some of which are in the parish, I will make myself familiar with them; there are some truly magnificent trees in the area.

I will look to share any knowledge either through the parishioner or, perhaps, events.

There is one Tree Officer for the whole of Herefordshire, Oliver Kaye, and whilst I will obviously try to support him, all applications etc still need to be done through the council processes.

Our shop in the news

Following a recommendation from Plunkett (the national charity supporting community business) we will be hosting a visit from SkyTV on November the 6th.

To quote Sky "The filming will be for a short feature video going out around December time looking at what's happening to historic church buildings as religious congregations decline". The main question the video piece will ask is: 'Are Britain's abandoned church buildings worth saving?'

They are interested in our story and how we came to be the first in the country to have a full-time shop in a church that was still being used for worship and how our church building remains at the heart of the community.

Somebody will be with us for most of the day and talking to several of us involved in both shop, café and church.

The final short film may then make their national news as well as online, etc.

If you are around that day feel free to pop down - you may be on the telly!

And in other news we were also invited recently to take part in a webinar, again organised by Plunkett, to share our story along with the recently opened Amberley shop near Stroud.

There were 46 people from rural churches around England and Scotland who had signed up to hear our stories as they are thinking about how they might use their, mainly rural, church buildings differently alongside worship.



Parish Hall Committee & Yarpole Flicks

Yarpole Group Parish Council November 2023



On Tuesday 3 October 2023 Councillor Audrey Bott was elected Chairman following the resignation, as Chairman only, of Councillor Linda Middleton. Linda was thanked for her chairmanship since September 2021.

The draft Budget for 2024/25 will be discussed at the November meeting and finalised at the December meeting. If you are interested in how the precept is spent, please do come along.

The metal estate fencing around the graveyard at Lucton needs to be repaired. Due to a lack of funds, this cannot be completed by the Parochial Church Council (PCC) unless a grant is available from the Parish Council. The PCC expressed its gratitude for maintenance support from the Parish Council and individual voluntary efforts. The Ford at Lucton was also discussed. A meeting is to be arranged to consider options to decrease flooding.

Receipt of the Bircher Common Management Plan from the National Trust was noted. It was reported that members of the Bircher Common Graziers Committee are in touch with The National Trust and no further action was agreed.

Herefordshire Council will be asked for a gate for the junction of Public Right of Way YP12 and Croft Lane. It was noted that landowners are responsible for maintaining gates and stiles, and they are encouraged to contact the Herefordshire Council Public Right of Way team if one has been damaged. For further information please contact the clerk.

A seesaw has been added to the playground, and the Chairman proposed a vote of thanks to Cllrs Cadwallader, Daniels, and Praill for their work on the Community Meadow.

A working group is to be set up to assess the efficacy of the Neighbourhood Development Plan, and to consider topics not covered in the Plan e.g., solar panel arrays.

Three planning applications were considered. P232595/K - Works to Trees in a **Conservation Area** for the felling of a birch tree was supported; having considered additional documents, no objection was raised to P204317/F Re-consultation on Land at Bicton House, Bicton, for a Proposed detached affordable dwelling and garage/workshop.

It was agreed to comment on application P232729/AM - Non Material Amendment Land adjacent to Maunds House and a letter has been sent highlighting objections and concerns. Since the meeting, it has been explained that applications for Non-Material Amendments are made when an applicant is seeking determination from the Local Planning Authority, under the provision of Section 96A of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990, as to whether or not the changes proposed are non-material in nature.

The Local Planning Authority (Herefordshire Council) is under no obligation to consult the public or the Parish Council for applications made under Section 96A. This explains why the Parish Council, and members of public, were precluded from commenting on this application.

Works at Maund House in the Conservation Area were discussed as concerns were raised that permissions had not been granted for a new garage and for works to a tree. Advice received from Planning Enforcement is that permission is required, and the owner has been informed. Planning Enforcement has also contacted Herefordshire Council's Tree Officer.

Upcoming meeting dates Tuesdays 7 November, and 5 December, 7.30 pm at The Parish Hall. There is no scheduled meeting in January 2024. Residents are encouraged to attend and may speak at the start of the meeting.

24/7 Automated Dispensing

A trial one may be installed at Kingsland first. It is not replacing the dispensary but is about enhancing the service that is already provided. Feedback has been positive from other surgeries using this in rural practices. It would allow 24/7 collection, reduce the waiting times outside the dispensary and would increase access for those who cannot visit the dispensary during normal opening times. It would also allow collections at w/e's and bank holidays. This would be as secure as an ATM with a 24/7 callout should there be a breakdown

lkg of medication can be loaded for a single patient into the automated box (bagged). This is scanned and the code to access the medication is sent via mobile phone to the patient. This is typed in on the touchpad on the box and the medication released. Payment would have to be set up by card reader or pre-payment. It does depend on having access to a mobile phone. The Practice is looking into whether an email address would work. It will not load controlled drugs.

The Practice is NOT forcing people to use it. It is an OPT-IN ONLY and will not suit all patients. They would like FEEDBACK - please feel free to contact me with your views.



Diocese of Hereford November 2023

Each year, the Royal British Legion's Remembrance Festival focuses on a different aspect of honouring those who have served the Crown and country in the armed forces. This year the theme is Service, not just of those deployed on active service, but the unseen service of those who love them. We're encouraged to remember the impact that their absence, and their homecoming, can have not just on the service personnel but on their loved ones.

Those are the hidden costs of serving in the armed forces. Those at home, whether they be parents, partners, spouses, or children, carry a load of anxiety for their loved one. There's the weight of managing without them and then of re-shaping lives and routines around them when they return. If they return, of course. If not, there's the burden of grief which will be carried life-long.

If they do return, they're forever changed by what they've experienced in combat or on peacekeeping duties. They may carry physical and mental scars, and not know how to express them except among their comrades, who don't need words because they just get it, because they've seen and heard and smelled the same things. That can have an impact on loved ones too.

I often tell the story in Remembrance services of a man I knew in my home church who had been a prisoner of war in Burma during World War II. He'd seen and experienced unimaginable things but would never talk to his wife about them. He didn't want to. He didn't want those images to be spoken of in his home back in England. They weren't to invade that precious space, that haven. But that didn't mean he'd forgotten, or that those memories didn't trouble him. He and his wife learned to live with them, and with the fact that some things just remained unspoken.

Perhaps in this year's season of Remembrance, as well as remembering and giving thanks for the sacrifice of those who fought and died in service of our nation and of peace, we can also remember to pray for those still serving now, for those who love them and support them, and for healing of the seen and unseen scars of war.

God of healing and of peace, in whose service is perfect freedom, we hold before you those who serve our nation in His Majesty's Armed Forces, and those who love them.

We pray that during times of separation you would protect their relationships.

We pray that during times of reunion you would ease the transitions and be present in homecomings.

We pray for healing of bodies, minds, and spirits broken by experiences of combat, and for healing of grief for those who will never return.

 $Hold\ and\ guard\ all\ who\ serve\ on\ behalf\ of\ others,\ and\ their\ loved\ ones,\ we\ pray. Amen.$

Plants of the Season

On 26th September ODGC welcomed Paul Green of Green's Leaves Nursery, Gloucestershire. Paul arrived with a magnificent array of plants with which to illustrate his talk and to sell.

Paul began by discussing grasses many of which come into their own in the autumn. These add structure, form and movement to the garden and when frosted transform the garden into a winter wonderland. They are largely trouble-free apart from thugs like Gardener's Garters which spread rapaciously, though he argued that even this with its green and striped foliage can look very attractive in a sunny spot confined by paving slabs.

Miscanthus thrives in sun or light shade. Varieties such as Skyrocket and Ferner Osten brighten the autumn garden and can be cut down in February or March. Molinia varieties with delicate flower heads add understated elegance to the border and subside gracefully in winter.

Moving on to foliage plants Paul advised against over protection in winter. Some protection is necessary, for example the crowns of Gunnera, but beware wrapping up evergreen Phormium for too long as it will rot.

Fatsias are excellent for shade, particularly the variegated varieties such as 'Camouflage'. Variegated plants generally do better in shade where they avoid scorching.

The underlying theme of Paul's talk was the importance of being selective and choosing named varieties. Hypericum can be a troublesome shrub, spreading quickly and seeding around. However Hypericum 'Berry Red' is a charming dwarf variety with flowers appearing at the same time as the vivid red berries. Similarly many can take or leave the plain pink Japanese anemone with its spreading habit but few can resist 'Dreaming Swan' with its more restrained habit and white petals delicately shaded with mauve or the shorter Fantasy series, growing 14 – 18 inches, filling out but not spreading invasively.

It is well known that gardeners can resist everything except temptation and at the conclusion of Paul's interesting and entertaining talk members and visitors lost no time in converging on his attractive collection of plants.

On Tuesday 28th November Meriet Duncan will be giving a talk entitled 'Creating a buzz about the Honeybee'.

Meriet began her love affair with honeybees in 2010. She is a local beekeeper who is passionate about educating everyone about bees.

We plough the fields and scatter

How much fun can you have with a bucket in the middle of a field? Surprisingly, quite a lot, when you're part of a wildflower seeding party. Last month a group of kind volunteers joined us to help create three new wildflower meadows on our land adjoining Bircher Common.

The project (funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund) was organised by the charity Buglife in association with Herefordshire Meadows. Work began earlier this year with the preparation of the ground. Sheep were sent in to crop the grass down as low as possible, but by the end of the summer the grass had outraced the sheep, so a contractor came in with a flail collector and reduced it to a close sward, followed by another contractor who ran a cultivator over it to expose some bare soil. Then we were ready for the seeding party.

Herefordshire Meadows provided us with two huge bags of seed harvested from a site in Titley which, records indicate, has been a wildflower meadow for hundreds of years. Rory from Herefordshire Meadows and Emily from Buglife measured the seed into several dozen buckets, and placed a row of posts in each field. By each post they placed a bucket of seed, and then more buckets half-way across the field. Each volunteer stood by a post, picked up their bucket – and started sowing. It's difficult to judge how much seed you're scattering! Some found their seed ran out before they reached their next bucket, others were more parsimonious and still had seed left when they should have sown it all. But one way or another all the seed was sown, and our reward was tea and a piece of cake or three.

Will the seed come up? We won't know till next spring, and even if it germinates well it will be several years before the fields start to look like properly-established wildflower meadows. But this is an investment for the future: our wildlife needs all the help it can get, and hopefully what we're doing will make a small difference. There's a public footpath (YP19) that runs along the edge of one of the fields, so you can watch its progress.
