WOODLANDS FOR WATER

Planting Trees to Help Our Rivers

Wye & Usk Foundation Advisors are offering free advice and support to farmers and land managers in the Wye catchment (England) to apply for grants to plant trees to create woodland, wood pasture, agroforestry and traditional orchards.

Benefits of Trees on Farms

Trees can provide shelter for livestock from sun and severe weather, protect crops from wind damage, retain soil moisture and improve drought resilience, stabilize riverbanks and provide shade for fish, reduce flooding downstream, capture eroding soils and nutrients, boost diversity and beneficial pollinator habitat. They can also be a source of production (timber, wood fuel, livestock browse, fruit or nuts and woodchip which can be mixed in with farmyard manure for fertiliser).

Background & Information

Woodlands for Water is the first project developed by the Riverscapes Partnership which, with support from Defra, aims to create more riparian and wider catchment planting in six river catchment areas from Devon to Cumbria by March 2025.

This project is being delivered through the Nature for Climate funding from Defra.

Christmas goodies of all sorts

G and R Tudge is a family-run business based in nearby Richards Castle and their Herefordshire-reared rare breed pigs and free range turkeys have locally become an essential component of a traditional Christmas meal.

Remember if you want to order your Christmas turkeys and sausages, hams, bacon, etc from them, to collect at the shop, then you will need to fill in a form which you can collect from the shop.

The orders will be ready to collect after midday on Friday 22^{nd} December. They will need to be collected by 13:00 on Saturday the 23^{rd} December at the latest as the shop will be closed after that until Wednesday 27^{th} December (Do let us know if you need your order any earlier than that as this can be arranged).

If you would like to order any speciality breads, dairy products, pies and patés then you will need to e-mail yarpoleshop@mail.com or leave a message in the shop for Rowena at least a week before you would like to collect them.

Hampers

The Christmas hamper raffle is now in full swing and the hamper is on display in the shop. Come and buy a ticket for £1 a number and see if this year the box filled with our delicious seasonal treats and fare will be yours this Christmas!

The raffle will be drawn on Thursday 21st December at 15:00 - which means the lucky winner has plenty of time to collect it and start to enjoy it over the Christmas weekend.

If you would like to buy a hamper as a gift then please ask in the shop and we will agree what you would like in it and the price you would like to pay and it will then be made up for you. Please allow a few days for us to do that and then we will let you know when it is ready for you to collect.

Post Office

Remember if you need to withdraw cash the Post Office also serves as an ATM and you can withdraw money from your account across the counter. The added advantage of using the Post Office is that for every withdrawal made the Post Office will donate a penny to the Trussell Trust - a charity which provides emergency food and essential toiletries to those in sudden acute need, and it also works to create a future where everyone can afford the essentials and no one needs to use a foodbank.

Sky visit

We had a very enjoyable visit from Sky TV who interviewed a number of us from shop and church and filmed the church (which was looking fabulous with the remembrance floral displays) and shop to create a short piece for broadcast.

One of the interviews was with one of our long serving (literally) volunteers whose story of what volunteering had meant to her the reporter found very moving. In fact she felt privileged to be able to spend the day filming what to her was a very positive story when so many of her journalistic colleagues were covering really grim stories from elsewhere in the world and so she felt that the editors might really appreciate a good news story to slot in to the news.

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CHURCH MATTERS



Christmas is, after Easter, the second most important time in the Christian calendar, the time to celebrate the amazing event of God's coming into the world in human flesh, to be one of us, yet perfect and sinless, unlike us, so that he could be our substitute and saviour and the only possible mediator between God and man. The true importance of this is obscured by the popular imagery of a baby in a manger surrounded by animals, which almost relegates it to a children's story; but if Jesus had never come into the world, there could be no cross and resurrection, and therefore no rescue from sin and its eternal penalty.

Luke 2:8 And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. 9 And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with fear. 10 And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy that will be for all the people. 11 For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord. 12 And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." 13 And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, 14 "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"

The unprecedented appearance of a host of angels celebrating and testifying to the birth demonstrates the importance in God's eyes of Jesus's coming into the world.

Watch out for unusual service times. The Nine Lessons and Carols service will be at Croft at 4 pm on 17th December and will be all (or mostly?) congregational singing. If possible, please park outside the gates and leave the parking next to the church for those who have difficulty walking. Carols Round the Tree will be at 3pm on the 24th (in Yarpole) so there will be no morning service on either of those Sundays. The service on 31st December will be a joint service for all parishes in the group and will be at Orleton church.

We hope to do a short carol service at 3pm on Saturday 9th December at Croft, chiefly for the benefit of National Trust visitors, but any extra support would be welcome. Check the events on the yarpole.org website to be sure it is happening.

We continue with our Be Still times on the first Wednesday of each month, as a time to just sit in silence (surprisingly difficult!) and meditate on some reading, sometimes with some gentle music.

January should be back to the normal service pattern.

Plans for the future

We held a really useful and friendly public meeting in early November, attended by over 40 members of the community. We were able to explain in detail what we do and how we operate, and to answer people's questions.

At the meeting we outlined our plans for the future, and if you weren't able to attend you might like to know what we are hoping to do:

- We are in the process of replacing the chairs in the café. The existing chairs are comfortable, but the upholstery isn't easy to keep clean and they don't really blend with the pale wood tables. We've already tried and rejected one style of chairs because, although they looked good, they weren't sufficiently comfortable. Our search will continue! The Shop Board has kindly agreed that we can make use of two grants allocated to us some time ago to help fund this purchase.
- The black folding chairs that are used for large gatherings are well past their useby date and need to be replaced. This will be an expensive purchase, and will need a lot of research to make sure that the ones we choose are practical, sturdy and comfortable.
- We would like to extend the very cramped café kitchen part-way into the storage gallery, to give the volunteers more working space. This is a very long-term project, requiring permission from the church authorities and advice from the Environmental Health team before we can even start formulating plans. It's impossible to put a time-scale to this, but we'll update you as things progress.

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Yarpole Group Parish Council December 2023

Four members of the public, the Tree Warden, Cllr Dan Hurcomb and PCSO Steph Harper attended the Parish Council (YGPC) meeting on Tuesday 7 November 2023.

PCSO Harper reported that thefts from outbuildings continue, but apart from this, crime in the area is low. Residents are asked to report

anything suspicious, however trivial. Crime prevention roadshows offer an opportunity to have property, bikes, tools etc., marked free of charge. Sign up for updates from the West Mercia Police: https://www.neighbourhoodmatters.co.uk/.

The Parish Council raised no objections to Planning Application P232989/J - Works to trees covered by TPO as the tree to be felled has Ash dieback. The Council agreed to object to application P233174/F - Planning Permission Land Adjacent to Maund House. Strong objections were made, including the development being permitted within approx. 90cm of the western site boundary as this would have a negative effect on the community's investment in The Bell at Yarpole.

A public meeting with Welsh Water to discuss foul drainage problems in Yarpole village has been arranged for 23rd November.

The draft budget for 2024-25 was discussed. This will be finalised on 5 December, and the Precept for 2024-25 set.

A site has been found for a defibrillator at Lucton village. Further advice will be taken before selecting the most appropriate model, after which a purchase will be made, with the help of a £1,000 grant from the Community Shop.

The Community Meadow working group has discussed planting schemes, thanks to Cllr Praill, and the installation of bollards around the car park. Two grant applications have been submitted towards the purchase of trees, and £500 offered by Kingspan Community Fund toward the purchase of wildflower turf. The bench at the far end of the field has been relocated, thanks to Cllrs Daniels and Cadwallader. The Parish Hall Committee sent their thanks for the purchase of a plaque for the QEII bench, and Cllr Grant is thanked for fixing it securely in place.

Tree planting sessions/laying wildflower turf will be arranged soon. IT IS NOT TOO LATE to join in – send your name and phone number or email address to the clerk. See contact details below.

Clearing weed growth by kerb stones and on pavements in Croft and Green Lane Crescents was discussed. Improving drainage at Lucton Ford is also under discussion, and a decision on which task should take priority, making best use of funding available from Herefordshire Council is to be taken. Funding is £140 per km of C or U road in the Parishes. The total this year, including £1,000 match funding from the Parish Council, is £4114. This is unlikely to be enough to complete works at Lucton Ford and Balfour Beatty is to let the Clerk know if they will carry out this task instead.

Upcoming meeting dates are Tuesdays 5 December 2023, 6 February, and 5 March 2024. 7.30 pm at The Parish Hall. There is no scheduled meeting in January. Residents are encouraged to attend and may speak during the public session at the start of the meeting.

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

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Diocese of Hereford December 2023

Dear Friends,

In court, juries will be suspicious if all the witnesses come up with the same story. Their role is to weigh up accounts to discern where the truth lies. In most situations it's remarkable how diverse people's perceptions of events can be. Such variation adds to the credibility of a story. This is especially true of the Christmas story in the Bible. The events are examined from a variety of angles. Diverse witnesses provided the source material for the Gospel writers to distil their accounts. We have an angle from kings, shepherds, and theologians keen to analyse things in the light of what God had already said through prophets hundreds of years previously. In the centre of the story is Mary, the young peasant girl in her teens, who finds herself inexplicably pregnant.

Her response is the exemplar of what it is to be a follower of Jesus. The angel tells her what is about to happen with only the sketchiest discussion of the personal implications. Her response is, "may it be unto me as you have said." Confronted with the reality of God, her answer is, "yes, now what is the question." She is in a long line of heroes of faith who exemplify unconditional obedience. Isaiah, confronted with a vision of God said, "here am I send me." The disciples required just a word from Jesus to leave everything and follow him. St. Paul was struck blind on the road to Damascus and meekly waited for what God was to tell him he must do.

We are coming to the end of our year of prayer in the diocese and moving to the year of faith. As we begin that journey together, Mary's, "yes, now what is the question?" is a good place to start. The Gospel was described by Rowan Williams as news not advice. The events of Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection stand at the turning point of history inviting us to respond with our own unconditional, "yes!"

Aeoniums in Habitat and Cultivation

On Tuesday 31 October ODGC welcomed Mellie Lewis, holder of the National Collection of Aeoniums. Mellie has been studying and collecting Aeoniums for almost 40 years and has approximately 300 varieties.

Aeoniums originate from the Macaronesian islands, Canaries, Cape Verde and Madeira and can also be found in the Yemen and Morocco. Most are endemic to the Canaries where they owe their success on this harsh volcanic terrain to moisture-bearing Trade Winds. The plants, members of the Crassulaceae family, have succulent leaves borne in rosettes with cilia along the leaf edges which trap moisture. The more mountainous the island, the more diverse the species. This is called adaptive radiation whereby a species has adapted to its environment whether this be dry and hot or the moist evergreen laurel cloud forest. They can even grow on terracotta pantiles where the leaf litter provides sufficient nutrient. Fuerteventura is the only Canary Island without Aeoniums.

Size and habit vary enormously. Some, the A. arborea spp, can be 2 metres high sporting a 1 metre high inflorescence which may be yellow, pink or white. These are pollinated by bees and small lizards which scramble over the plants in search of insects. They are monocarpic and die after flowering, scattering millions of seeds. Others are stalkless, for example A. tabuliforme, others have a sprawling habit like A. haworthii.

Aeoniums are threatened by invasive plants (Agave, Kalanchoe and Opuntia) and by animals (feral goats and rabbits) which damage ancient water systems. The creation of new roads to promote tourism destroys habitat and the climate is no longer predictable resulting in the abandonment of farmsteads.

The first record of Aeoniums found in the UK is an illustration dated 1699 in the Duchess of Beaufort's botanical collection. They have become very popular in recent years, many resulting from crosses with purple black A. swartkop discovered in a nursery in The Netherlands in the 1950s. They are easy to propagate from stem cuttings or seed. Members were warned to beware imports of Korean and Chinese variants as these are not new cultivars but result from irradiation or grafting.

Mellie's fascinating talk was accompanied by a wonderful slideshow of these striking architectural plants growing wild in the Canary Islands.

THE CURIOUS GARDENER

The Midnight Feast

When we first moved here, nearly eighteen years ago, multiple wasp nests were an annual feature. Each summer we'd have several in the tool shed, while others were built behind soffits and cladding. We regarded them as a nuisance and didn't hesitate to destroy any nests whose occupants were too intrusive. Wasps were hardly an endangered species, we thought, and there would always be more nests next summer.

But we were wrong. We've seen fewer and fewer each year, and last year we didn't see a single one. We were worried that perhaps they were declining the way the birds and bats have declined in our neighbourhood. So this year we were very pleased to find we had three wasps' nests: two in vole holes in the garden, and one at the side of the compost heap in the orchard. We watched them with interest, skirting round them at a safe distance and enjoying their company.

But it seemed that someone else had their eye on the nest in the compost heap. One morning we found that it had been dug out and destroyed during the night. A few confused wasps were still clinging to the remains of their nest, but all their compatriots and all their grubs were gone. The culprit? A badger.

In late summer and early autumn, wasps' nests change. Instead of producing worker grubs, they start producing queen and drone grubs which are bigger. That's when they provide the most protein for the badgers, so that's why the badger attacked it when it did. It must have been keeping an eye on it all summer to see how it was progressing, and then moved in for the kill when the meal was biggest. How it withstood the stings on its tongue and nose I've no idea.

We were sorry to see it end this way, but glad that the two other nests escaped unharmed. Hopefully there are some queens hiding in a dry place somewhere in the garden, ready to build again next year.

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Brian Mitchell

It was with great sadness and affection that a very full St Leonard's said goodbye to Brian on October 16th. It was a wonderful tribute to Brian that so many people came to celebrate his life. Family, friends and colleagues came from far and wide to share memories and reflect on the impact Brian had on their lives.

Brian was a man of many parts and I think it true to say that few of us were aware of just how varied those parts were. Brian was a loving husband, father, stepfather, grandfather, step-grandfather and step-great-grandfather. He was also an academic, a skilled administrator and a deft catalyst.



Born in Uxbridge in 1950, Brian grew up in Burgess Hill and went to the University of Kent to study Law in 1971, subsequently moving on to the London School of Economics to do his Masters. Whilst a student in Kent Brian met Anne and together they moved to the Midlands where Brian took up a post as lecturer in the Faculty of Law at the University of Wolverhampton.

Brian remained at the university ultimately becoming Dean of the Faculty of Law before retiring. It was a delight to hear the recollections of his past students. Brian was clearly an inspirational teacher as well as a dedicated and effective manager of the faculty. Charlotte and Jake were born to Brian and Anne in the early years of his career. His pride in his children was apparent to anyone who knew Brian.

In 1993 Brian moved to Ironbridge with Viv and shortly afterwards they moved to Seifton Batch in the gorgeous South Shropshire countryside where they lived for twenty happy years. Whilst living at Seifton Batch Brian explored his interest in tasks outside of his skill set, such as plumbing and digging a land drain. He was always willing to take the plunge and encouraged his children to do the same.

Viv and Brian married in 2011, on Christmas Eve, and moved to Yarpole five years after retiring. Once settled in our village Brian got involved in a range of activities, their breadth reflecting his wide-ranging interests and skills. He coedited The Parishioner, he was secretary to the Living History Group and he was the driving force behind the creation of our Men's Shed. He also led the parish Walking Group with Viv, acted as sound engineer for concerts and plays and offered his help whenever asked. In addition to all of this he also gave generously of his time to older individuals in the village. He was also a decent waiter!

As well as giving so much of himself to our community, Brian would do all he could to inspire and support his family. One of Brian's two step-daughters, Anita, remembers how Brian gave them the courage to go and explore Europe, how he supported them when they bought their first homes, organised wonderful birthday celebrations, and introduced them to art and fine dining. She says 'We are both very lucky to have met, known and spent time with such a generous and kind hearted man who had such a sense of fun. Thank you Brian. We love you'.

In Yarpole Brian could indulge his passion for new technology, relishing its ability to cut his lawn, clean the house and show him what was happening inside the house in Italy when he was in the UK. As well as this compendium of interests Brian had a lifelong love of music, fully appreciating the genius of Bob Dylan and the majesty of Abba.

Brian had an open mind, a dry wit and an enthusiasm for life. His untimely death deprives us all of the company of this gentle man.

Where has the time gone? I have read some brilliant books in 2023, and I thought it would be nice to recommend some of them to you. I hope you enjoy them. Emperor of Rome by Mary Beard – My favourite book of the year. This is a companion piece to the bestselling 'SPQR' and shines a new light on the world and the lives of the Ancient Roman emperors. Impeccably well researched, written in an accessible way, and packed full of anecdotes and humour, this book basically unpicks what it meant to be the ruler of Ancient Rome, and what this tells us about Ancient Roman society as a whole. Perfect for scholars, beginners and everyone in between, this book is a treat from start to finish. Mary Beard demonstrates once again why she is one of the world's leading authorities on Ancient Rome. Read it and be amazed.

Fire and Blood by George R. R. Martin – Game of Thrones fans take note. This is the inspiration for the prequel series 'House of the Dragon', and if you have not read this yet, you really need to rectify that. Let me start by saying it is written in a very different style to the main book series. So much so, it actually reads more like a historical textbook than a typical fantasy novel, but don't let that put you off. This book is amazing! It details the history of Westeros during several centuries of Targaryen rule, along with all the drama, intrigue and bloodshed that went with it. George R. R. Martin is an incredible fantasy writer, and this highlights his talents to perfection. The amount of detail in this is nothing short of mind blowing. If you are in any way interested in this, even if that interest is merely casual, please do give it a go. You will not be disappointed.

Us Against You by Fredrik Backman – The second book in the acclaimed 'Beartown' trilogy, this picks up where the first book left off. For those of you who are unfamiliar with these books, they follow the lives of the inhabitants of Beartown, a Swedish town which revolves around ice hockey and its local teams. They pretty much eat, sleep and breathe ice hockey. One day, one of the team's leading players does something that has huge repercussions for him and the town as a whole. I really loved the first book in the trilogy, but I think this sequel is even better. Fredrik Backman is one of my favourite contemporary writers and this book shows off his writing in the best possible light. He really knows how to write about human nature and, as a result, you experience just about every possible emotion whilst working your way through this novel. It is fantastic. And if this trilogy does not appeal to you, Backman has several other books that have been translated and published in English and as far as I'm concerned, you cannot go wrong with any of them.

Essex Dogs by Dan Jones – Dan Jones is one of the UK's top medieval historians, and although he has published several non-fiction books and a novella, this is his first foray into full length historical fiction. He sticks to a period he knows well, the 100 Years War, and the result is spectacular. It's gritty, exciting, immersive, realistic, and has a bunch of wonderful, fully realised characters at its centre. I literally could not put it down whilst I was reading it, which I think is more than enough proof of just how good it is. It is also the first book in a planned trilogy. In fact, the second book, 'Wolves of Winter', has just been published. Give this one a try and go on an unforgettable medieval adventure.
