

As we come to the end of our first year I thought I would do a little write-up to enlighten you all as to what we get up to in our Communal Crafters meetings! The group has been going for less than a year, but we have already built up a strong core of members which grows at every meeting. As the ad says, we are a friendly group who meet once a month to chat and craft and we are always looking forward to welcoming new members.

There is indeed a lot of chatting and exchanging of tips and techniques, but it's a lot more than that! We are forging new friendships and bonds (something that this parish is very good at), sharing ideas and being introduced to new crafting skills. The group consists of all kinds of crafters with different skill levels and on occasions we have demos and other activities. However, nobody is put under pressure to take part - our lovely members can be involved with as much or little as they wish - we enjoy a very relaxed atmosphere at our meetings!

### Made in HR6 returns to St Leonard's

25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> November saw the return of the ever popular Made in HR6 festive art and craft fair after a four-year break due to Covid. The event featured a wide range of works by 16 local artists and makers who exhibited in the nave, the Bell Tower and on the church courtyard.

Some 591 people visited St Leonard's over the weekend – coming to browse and buy and to visit the Gallery Café and the Yarpole Community Shop. Visitors also had the opportunity to bid for taster sessions with local makers in a silent auction, to enter a prize quiz and to buy raffle tickets. Thanks are due to the many providers of prizes for these activities. Together with the fees paid by stallholders and the income from the café the surplus for the event was just over £2,700 – to the benefit of St Leonard's Management towards the costs of running and maintaining our wonderful community hub. Additionally the shop benefited from increased turnover and the event was a good opportunity to sell copies of the Yarpole Parish Festive Recipe Booklet.

The feedback from exhibitors and visitors has been universally good - praising the friendliness of Yarpole and the helpfulness of everyone involved. Huge thanks to the many people who volunteered to help in the planning and execution of the event; it couldn't happen without you!

You will be pleased to hear that the Yarpole Festive Recipe Booklet has flown off the shelves throughout its very successful launch in mid November. To date, circa Jan 10th, sales have reached 181 - in the café, at HR6 and in the shop. Rowena and her team of volunteers have promoted the booklet at every opportunity to great effect.

In addition to the excellent sales of the booklet we also received donations from customers who gave us £5 per copy (instead of the price of £4.50) as well as others who gave cash donations ranging from £2 to £5.

As it stands we expect to bank £837 overall, including sales and donations. Taking into account printing costs of £206.96 this will mean that £630.04 will be shared between the PCC and SLM - all going, ultimately, to the running of our beautiful church and bell tower. So, to everyone who has bought a copy (or more) of our Festive Recipe Booklet we, the Recipe Booklet Team, say thank you so very much for supporting our community initiative.

Thank you all for your custom and support over Christmas and the New Year. We enjoyed a good trading period and were also pleased to see so many people aware that they could come to us to get treats not available in the supermarkets, as well as browse the craft section and find some more unusual small gifts for friends and family - including some last minute panic solutions.

We have mentioned this before, so apologies for repetition, but there is still some surprise expressed at what you can do in our Post Office. The growing absence of banks in our high street is a regular conversation topic and many people still seem largely unaware that the Post Office can fulfil many of your daily banking transactions.

Most banks have agreements with the PO for them to be able to do this - and there is no extra cost to you.

From cash withdrawals and deposits, to banking cheques, checking your balance and changing your PIN the PO counter is now the physical point of contact where these transactions can take place.

There is often no need to drive into Leominster, Hereford or Ludlow if you have a PO counter nearby - and every transaction benefits the shop so do remember us.

# Yarpole Group Parish Council—Dec meeting

Councillors welcomed 3 members of public to the Parish Council meeting on 5 December 2023.

**Highways.** In the knowledge that the Local Authority (Herefordshire Council) is responsible for its maintenance, it was decided that

Balfour Beatty (BBLP) be asked to undertake drainage improvements to the Ford at Lucton, rather than instructing a Lengthsman. The Lengthsman has been asked to clear Green Lane Crescent Footway (Z92603), clear debris from pavements in two locations on Green Lane, cut two grips on Croft Lane to allow surface water to drain, and to clear weeds and debris from and gutters/kerbs in Croft Crescent and Green Lane Crescent. Certain costs for these works will be reimbursed via the Lengthsman Funding Scheme. In addition, BBLP has been contacted about the disabled bay markings on the road outside the Church which need re-painting. Cllr Hurcomb's generous offer to fund hedge trimming at Bircher Knoll was declined on hearing that arrangements had already been made for it to be cut this winter. Members expressed their gratitude to Cllr Hurcomb for his willingness to help. BBLP has agreed to include the verge mowing at this location in its annual schedule.

**Planning**. Cllr Jenkins expressed disappointment that more lower cost housing is not being built, reflecting the needs of the village, and enabling its sustainability. It was recommended that this be considered when the Neighbourhood Development Plan is reviewed. Four applications were discussed. No objections were raised on three applications: P230140/F Land west of Cockgate Farm, Yarpole, for a proposed erection of two linked-detached dwellings (the linking element comprising a pair of integral, single garages); P233453/K - Works to Trees in a Conservation Area at Elfstone, Lucton; and P233463/F Land at the Rear of Yarpole Village Hall, Green Lane, Yarpole, Variation of Condition 1 of planning permission 211311 (Proposed variation of condition 2 of planning permission 173484) — to amend the design of Plot 1 Acorn House.

The Parish Council did not comment on application P233364/F for a proposed sprayer store at Mortimers Cross Farm as it is in Aymestrey Parish.

**Finance.** Receipt of a £500 grant from Kingspan for wildflower turf at the Community Meadow was noted. The Parish Council's budget for 2024/25 was set at £30,015.49 and a precept for 2024/25 of £29,000 agreed. The deficit between budget and precept will come from reserves.

Combined NatWest bank balances were £52,021.69 including Reserve £7,000, General Reserve £6,116.93, Earmarked: Election Costs £2,000, Community Meadow £21,225.37, Kingspan Grant £500. TOTAL Earmarked £36,842.30, Non-Reserve/earmarked: £15,179.39.

**Consultation.** In response to Herefordshire Council regarding the Public Space Protection Orders, The Parish Council has asked for confirmation that The Community Meadow, the churchyard at Yarpole and burial grounds at Yarpole and Lucton are 'public places' under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 and requested that dogs be excluded from the playground in the Community Meadow.

The Parish Council normally meets on the first Tuesday of the month (except August and January). Upcoming meeting dates are Tuesdays 6 February, 5 March at 7.30 pm at The Parish Hall. Residents are encouraged to attend and may speak during the public session at the start of the meeting.

#### **Welsh Water**

A public meeting took place on 23 November 2023 with Gareth Morris, Local Network Engineer and Jenny Grubb, River Quality Liaison Manager at Welsh Water.

Slides giving information from the meeting can be seen on the Parish Council's website – see the link on the homepage.

It was explained that the Yarpole sewage system is not capable of coping with foul drainage and surface water. It is not possible to pass more flow forward to Luston, as it is also liable to hydraulic overload. A solution must, therefore, be found in Yarpole. Costs range from £150k to £4m and cannot be funded by Welsh Water as part of environmental improvement works.

Welsh Water has suggested a pilot scheme at Yarpole, trialling the use of leaky water butts at a number of dwellings in the village. 50 water butts were discussed. How this project will be delivered and who will install the water butts is to be decided.



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

# Doing more by doing less

For most of my gardening life I followed the traditional gardening methods recommended in my gardening bible, *The Amateur Gardener* by Arthur Hellyer (published in 1948, but still a force to be reckoned with when I started gardening). According to Arthur, serious gardening required serious chemicals (formaldehyde was his particular recommendation for rendering garden soil sterile), as well as serious physical effort. Nature couldn't be left to get on with her business unaided. Autumn was the time to get out the rake and remove all the fallen leaves from the borders. Winter was digging time, when every square inch of soil that didn't actually contain a plant would be turned over and belted a few times with the back of the fork to break up lumps. It was all a lot of work but if that's what Arthur said I should do, who was I to argue?

A lot has changed since Arthur's day, and not just attitudes to garden chemicals. Now the experts are recommending 'no dig gardening'. According to the RHS website, 'digging damages soil structure by destroying natural drainage channels made by worms, disturbing fungal networks, and releasing carbon that's locked in the soil'. So now I'm going with the flow. Instead of raking off the leaves I leave them where they lie and just cover them up with a layer of manure or garden compost. That's it — no raking, no digging, no thumping the clods with a fork. The worms do the work instead. It's a great deal easier on the back, and saves so much time. The best thing is, the heavy clay soil in the beds where I've been experimenting with this for a couple of years has taken on a more crumbly texture and a darker colour.

So I'm sorry, Arthur, but on this point I'm going to leave your advice unheeded. Oh, and you can keep your formaldehyde too.

### Pam Blythe 1941 - 2023

Pam and Tony moved to Yarpole in 2000. Pam had retired as Deputy Head at a Secondary School in Kent and Tony was a graphic designer. They soon settled into Yarpole and brought their talents to various projects. It was a time of change in the village - the church was being adapted to its present configuration and the village shop had closed. Pam was soon using her organisational abilities in setting up and helping to manage the Portakabin shop behind the pub and Tony used his practical skills to help in the conversion. Perhaps some you remember collecting your Sunday papers from their porch. The shop and Post Office were welcomed by the village and supported by many volunteers. I was told very firmly that when I moved to Yarpole permanently I would be doing the Thursday morning shift. I did not think to demur and have done Thursday mornings for the last 16 years. To give up would be unthinkable! Pam also served on the Parish Hall committee.

Pam's talents took in the whole range of crafts: needlework of all kinds, knitting (winning a first prize at Kington Show), lace making, dressmaking and more. She had trained in textiles and used her pattern making and needlecraft skills to recreate historical costumes for the National Trust at Berrington Hall. She handmade exquisite miniature dolls in historic costumes which she took to talks she gave for the WI.

She has left behind a real legacy in the unique sets of vestments made for St Leonards which involved groups of villagers including the Youth Club dyeing fabric, making patchworks etc., which she sewed into the wonderful vestments the church is lucky to have today. I remember visiting her and watching her painstakingly sewing small fabric chain links onto the stoles representing St Leonard as the patron saint of prisoners. If you look at them today you cannot see a single stitch.

She initiated a monthly sewing group which undertook various projects including the textile 'stained glass window' war memorial which hangs in the church. We humble members sewed the names but the finished work is the result of her work with Brenda Cooper who also shared her eye for detail and perfection.

After Covid she eventually had her ailments diagnosed as Lewy Body Dementia with Parkinsonisms. This gradually left her unable to pursue any of her beloved handicrafts which was a tremendous sadness to her. Her mobility declined and she greatly missed the Tai Chi classes (a long term interest) but was very appreciative that Rose Jacks would collect her each week after a class so she could enjoy the fellowship of meeting over coffee.

Gradually she needed more and more support from carers and friends. She had many faithful and kind friends in Yarpole who never failed to visit, take her out, support and comfort her. An unexpected stroke led to her eventual death. Her memorial tea at St Leonard's echoed the one she held for Tony and she would have been proud that so many people remembered her and admired her work on display.

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# **Horrible Historic Homicide in Yarpole**

William Haywood, aged 61, of Yarpole was hanged in December 1903 for the murder of his wife, Jane. The murder, trial and execution generated huge public interest and were widely reported in newspapers across England. 60+ articles are still accessible on the internet, from Merseyside to Devon.

The couple were married in 1877 though their first son William was born in 1871, and Jane had another child before the marriage. Their other children were Alice, Emily, Elizabeth (Lizzie), Thomas and James. The marriage was turbulent with many allegations of abuse. Jane had left William several times, afraid he would harm her.

Born a farm labourer's son in Eye, William came from a dysfunctional family knowing insanity, alcoholism, learning disability and domestic abuse. His mother - said to be delusional - lived apart from his father for years because of the latter's cruelty. William is described as a soldier in the 1881 Census, like his grandfather. He absconded, wearing his uniform, from the Scots Fusiliers in Dublin in 1871 to live with an Irish woman, but later returned to Herefordshire. He worked as a farm labourer, roadman, and quarryman, latterly for Leominster Rural District Council at Pokehouse Quarry, in Bacon Lane, Aymestrey, at the far end of the Croft Estate.

It is reported that on Friday July 10<sup>th</sup> 1903 William and Jane argued, because she interrupted his drinking in the Bell Inn, Yarpole to fetch him for his dinner. He went home but left again later and stayed out all night. According to the licensee, on Saturday at 7.30am William drank a pint of beer at the Mortimer's Cross Inn, and bought pint bottles of beer and whisky before going to the quarry. Jane left home about 8.00 to take William his breakfast and work with him, and was seen on her way carrying a basket.

William met a local baker about 1.15pm back at Mortimer's Cross and said he had thrown a stone at Jane that hit her head, which was bleeding. He went on "if she is dead when I get back I will bury her in the brook." That evening after 8.30pm several people met William between the inn and Mortimers Cross Mill, pushing a wheelbarrow containing his terribly injured wife. The police and doctor were sent for and found the Haywoods lying in the road. William told the police the same story as before but was detained. The police search of the quarry early on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> revealed signs of a severe struggle, blood-stained rocks, bloodied sticks, a basket and empty bottles. Jane's post mortem showed a fractured skull, broken leg and many other injuries. William was taken into custody, charged with his wife's murder.

The inquest into Jane's death was opened at 3.30pm on Monday July 13<sup>th</sup> at the Mortimer's Cross Hotel. The jury of sixteen local men viewed the body and heard evidence of identification from Elizabeth Haywood. The inquest was adjourned. William was taken by cab to Leominster and thence by train to Hereford, a large crowd watching him leave. Jane Haywood's funeral took place at St Leonard's Yarpole on Tuesday July 14<sup>th</sup> with only her family and the officiant, Rev. W.H.Neales, present. Her grave is unmarked.

William was tried at Hereford Shire Hall on 28th November 1903 before Mr. Justice Bigham. Crowds lined the streets to see the judge leave his lodgings in High Town, his coach accompanied by trumpeters and footmen. The Shire Hall was packed.

William's counsel put forward a defence of insanity. He had been a patient in the Hereford lunatic asylum whose doctor, Morrison, testified that Haywood was "an imbecile of the higher grade" and that consuming alcohol had led to temporary insanity.

The judge and jury were not impressed. In his summing-up the judge stated that "lunatics should not escape punishment just because they were lunatics", that "plenty of lunatics knew when they were committing sin" and that William Hayward was "given to extraordinary wickedness". It took the jury just a few minutes to find him guilty and he was sentenced to death. As he was led from the court his daughter called "Goodbye Dad". Haywood said to his attendants, "They expected me to faint, but I didn't!"

William Haywood's was the last hanging at Hereford, the only one in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The gaol (by the bus station in Commercial Road) was designed by John Nash (more famous for Marble Arch London and the Brighton Pavilion). Completed in 1796 and opening that summer, it cost £18,646 16s 3 1/2d. Modified through the 1800s, it closed in 1929 and, after a period of public sight-seeing, was demolished. A plaque in Commercial Road denotes its location.



Public hangings took place up to 1864 on the flat roof of the single storey prison gatehouse, where the "New Drop" gallows was erected. Twenty people were executed there but this stopped in 1868, when the law ruled that executions must be held in private. A new gallows was built specifically to hang Willam Haywood (Leominster News).

He was hanged by Henry Pierrepoint (father of the more famous Albert, the last British hangman) on the grey and drizzly morning of Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> December 1903. He made the short walk in the open air from his cell to the scaffold "without assistance" (Daily Telegraph). To prevent the public seeing the hanging, workmen repairing the roof of the nearby Merton Hotel were forbidden to climb their ladders before 8.15am. The only public witnesses allowed to watch the execution were one of William Haywood's daughters and the prison chaplain, the Rev. C.A.Treherne. The Sheriff and Prison Governor were also present. The crowd of several hundred outside the prison heard the thud of the trapdoor as the cathedral bell chimed at 8.00am, then the prison bell rang to say the execution was over.

An inquest was held on the body, with a Coroner's Jury of twelve Hereford men. The prison surgeon certified that he had examined William Haywood and confirmed he was dead. The prison governor testified that the execution had been "skilfully and expeditiously carried out" and the jury confirmed that he had been executed according to law. William Haywood was buried guickly and without ceremony in a simple coffin in the prison yard near the scaffold. His death was registered in the normal way, in Hereford, in December 1903.

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# What we did in the holidays

'We're off on holiday in couple of weeks,' we might say.

'Oh, are you going anywhere nice?'

'No, we're spending two weeks in a hole in the ground in North Korea,' we might reply, but we don't, because we know it's meant to be a friendly way of saying 'Tell us about your holiday, boast about the delights of Rome or Marrakesh or Bridlington or wherever you're going.' So normally there is no hesitation before laying out a summary of the pleasures to come.

This time, however, we did hesitate. Back in the summer of 2022 we had booked two back-to-back cruises on a small French ship for October 2023, from Nice to Turkey, and on to Egypt, Israel and Jordan (to see a pyramid or two, Petra, the Dead Sea etc, trip of a lifetime stuff). Then in early October the Israel-Gaza war blew up. Half an hour before we were to board the first cruise we were told the second one had been cancelled. Instead of flying back from Amman we would be left on the quayside in Antalya two weeks earlier and would need to get back home some other way.

I always make sure to take Val on holiday with me. She has a mobile, which on this occasion came in handy for finding another ship to carry us from the eastern Med back to the south of France. It was a larger vessel, owned by Regent, an American company, which meant that all negotiations had to go via New York, several hours behind, so each simple question (and there were several) took an entire working day to resolve. And payment was only in dollars, which we hadn't thought to bring.

Because we couldn't get to its starting point in Istanbul in time, the ship arranged to pick us up in one of its scheduled ports of call, Kusadasi, a mere nine-hour taxi-ride across the bottom left hand corner of Turkey from Antalya. Unfortunately, we were told at the outset, the cruise was fully booked so there were no cabins left, only suites, which of course cost more; but we would have the money from the abandoned cruise to put towards it, so reasoned that, since we didn't have a choice in the matter, we might as well suck it up.

They must have taken pity on us because when we introduced ourselves they told us we had been upgraded. 'How can you be upgraded from a suite?' we wondered, thinking it already the most luxurious form of accommodation a ship can offer. It was by having a walk in wardrobe, a big bathroom with top-of-the-range soaps, oils and unguents, a huge balcony wrapping round the stern and a good few yards of the side, and a butler thrown in for good measure, to bring our freshly laundered clothes (even Val was impressed by the ironing), canapés and champagne before dinner in the evening. It was surreal. At first. But it's amazing how quickly you can get used to having staff around.

It was odd too because a couple of years previously we had booked another cruise, around the Baltic, calling in at St Petersberg, and that was cancelled two days before Putin invaded Ukraine.

People now ask us where we're going for our next holiday, so they can go somewhere else. I hope it's somewhere nice.
