

Patients' Participation Group (PPG)

Covid-19 Spring Booster Vaccination Those eligible are people aged 75 and over by June 30 2024, residents in care homes for older adults and those aged 6 months and over who are immunosuppressed. Depending on vaccine availability clinics will run on April 27 and May 11. If you are eligible you should receive a confirmation text or letter by April 22. If not, you should phone reception.

Mumps and Rubella Vaccination Those aged 12 months - 25 years who are not vaccinated or only partially vaccinated should contact the surgery to book an appointment.

Did not attend appointments (DNAs) In March 2024 there were 125 DNAs equating to 2.5 days of clinic time wasted. If you are unable to attend an appointment **please contact the surgery** so that the appointment can be given to someone else.

Repeat Prescriptions Please allow 72 hours for your prescription to be ready. (This does not include weekends and Bank Holidays.) It needs to be dropped off before 2.00pm (Mon—Fri) to guarantee the 72 hour turnaround.

Training Afternoons The practice will be closed from 12 noon on July 17 and Oct 17. A receptionist will field all calls until 6.00pm. After 6.00pm, ring 111.

Preparing a New Local Plan for the County



Herefordshire Council is currently reviewing its Local Plan which will set out the housing, economy, and environment proposals for the County, from now until 2041. This exercise is required by the Government and is carried out every 5 years.

Yarpole is included in that plan with a target of approximately 15 more houses by 2041. Once this plan, currently in draft form, is confirmed then we shall have to review our Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP), against which the Parish Council reviews local planning applications and makes submission to the County Planners.

You can see a draft of the County Local Plan online and make comment here: https://hlp.commonplace.is. The Parish Council will be reviewing it and making a response, but it is important that anyone who has a view makes their own submission as well. The more views expressed, the more weight they carry. If you do respond and wish to share your views with the Parish Council for consideration as part of its response, please send them to clerk@yarpolegroupparishcouncil.gov.uk.

Please note that this consultation ends on Monday 20 May.

CHURCH MATTERS

The Spring is a time of two festivals of great significance in the life of the church, Easter and Pentecost. March and April saw our commemoration of the death and resurrection of Jesus, who died on the cross to take our sins away, and rose from the dead on the third day.



May begins with Rogation Sunday, followed by three rogation days on Monday to Wednesday. Rogation (the word comes form a Latin word that means to ask) is a time for asking for God's blessing on the crops, and it often involved a procession round the borders of a parish, called "Beating the Bounds". The rogation days were days of fasting and prayer. Sunday 5 May will be a group Rogation service for the western parishes at Ivington.

The Thursday of that same week is Ascension Day, which remembers our Lord's ascent into Heaven after teaching his disciples for the 40 days following his resurrection.

Ten days after that (19 May) is Pentecost or Whit Sunday, which remembers the day when the Holy Spirit first came on all the believers. It is, effectively, the birthday of the universal church. It is the Holy Spirit of God who lives in each believer, unites us into one body and enables us to live a life that can please God.

Finally the 26 May is Trinity Sunday, which calls our attention to the mysterious nature of God, who is both the one and only God and yet is also eternally three persons: the Father, the Son (who became the perfect man, Jesus) and the Holy Spirit. Frankly, this is beyond our understanding and can only be accepted as plainly taught by all the scriptures taken together.

We continue our Be Still sessions for half an hour on the first Wednesday of each month. These are times to sit and meditate in quiet, perhaps with some music.

On Monday 15 April we began a course called Christianity Explored, which is an introduction to the content of Christian faith. This is for anyone who wants to know why they should bother with Christianity, and also for believers who want to consolidate their understanding. It is being led by Phillippa Wright, who is currently being trained for the priesthood.

From the scripture:

Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart, giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ.

Crunch time for the Gallery Café

Last month we highlighted the worrying shortage of volunteers in the Gallery Café that we are experiencing. Since then, our position has become more serious. By the time you read this, our fantastic manager, Sarah, will have left us. She has been undergoing treatment for a serious health condition and is no longer able to continue to work. Sarah has been a powerhouse of energy and enthusiasm, and we will miss her very much indeed.

So now we are not only without a manager, but we are so short of volunteers that we are having to cut back on what we do. Our remaining volunteers are over-stretched and in need of some new comrades. We are particularly short of people willing to help serve lunches on Thursdays and Fridays.

If we have to stop offering lunches it will be a huge blow for those members of the community for whom a hot meal and some friendly company is a key part of maintaining their well-being. It will also affect us financially: the café is the major source of funds for St Leonard's Management.

The Trustees and volunteers have been working together to decide how best to fill the gap left by Sarah's departure. We are considering a number of options, including employing another manager, or employing a cook and having a management team of volunteers. We hope that, by the time you read this, we will have a strategy and direction in place. But without more volunteers the Gallery Café faces a very uncertain future.

We can't over-emphasise the value of our café to the community. It's been running for over a decade: don't let 2024 be the year that it collapses.



THE MATHS CHALLENGE

Magic Squares


My primary school maths teacher, Mr Rowe, taught me a special method to fill a number square with consecutive counting numbers so that all the rows each add up to the same total, all the columns each add up to the same total and so do both diagonals.

So can you use the counting numbers 1,2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9 only once in this 3x3 square so that all the rows, columns and diagonals each add up to 15? (N.B. there may be more than one solution.) One correct solution is provided on page 34.



BUT his method only works with odd numbered squares, i.e.. 3x3, 5x5, 7x7, 101x101, 103x103, etc. I can complete any odd number sized square and get the rows, columns and diagonals to always add up to the same total using Mr Rowe's method.

Those who solved the 3x3 square may want to challenge themselves by attempting the 5x5 square using the numbers 1 to 25 once each so that each row, column and diagonal adds up to 65. (Solution available on page 34.)



YARPOLE GROUP PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on 2 April at the Parish Hall. The following is a short report; for further information please read the Minutes which are available on the website.

The Parish Council was pleased to welcome Cllr Diane Hill who was co-opted as a member for Croft & Yarpole. Cllr Hill will continue in the role of Tree Warden.

Residents and councillors were encouraged to continually report potholes to Herefordshire Council.

The council discussed two planning applications: a retrospective application for a small field shelter and change of use for a dog exercising field at Stocking Barn Farm Lucton, and a proposed affordable dwelling and garage/workshop at Bicton House. The council had no objection to either application but is concerned at the preponderance of retrospective applications being received.

Concerns over raw sewage spills were raised. No update had been received from Welsh Water. Cllr Hurcomb agreed to follow this up, and the clerk will ask when the promised water butts, recommended to help reduce surface water entering the drainage system, will be provided.

Updates had been received from Herefordshire Council Traffic Management about Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) requests made by the Parish Council.

- a) Cockgate. The merits of the proposal were acknowledged by Traffic Management. Consideration around removal of the centre line, new edge of carriageway markings and speed roundels was mentioned, but no works are proposed this year due to lack of funds. The Parish Council was asked if it would commit to funding the scheme. Cllr Hurcomb agreed to follow this up, particularly if the stretch of road is to be re-surfaced.
- b) Request for introduction of 40mph speed limit on the B4362 near junction with Croft Lane U92600. Traffic Management confirmed it is unable to approve this request. It suggested "the possibility of 'SLOW' markings may be appropriate at this location to enhance the current warning signage already in place". Traffic Management would support this should the Parish Council seek to pursue treatment works through the Community Commissioning Model.



Dear Friends

May marks the end of the Easter season and the beginning of what is affectionately known as 'ordinary time' in the Church calendar. The pivot happens at the feast of Pentecost on May 19 this year. Every Sunday is always a celebration of the resurrection, so its hard to see what is ordinary about it. The events of the Christ's death and resurrection are the turning point of history. It is a world-shattering event that means life can never be the same again. The book of Acts tells us how the disciples' lives were turned upside down by it. In their grief at the loss of Jesus a number were considering returning to their previous occupations. Once they encountered the risen Lord, they decided to change the world instead!

However, it was not just historical events which changed things. It was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Christian faith has always been a supernatural one. In the struggles to fill rotas, find volunteers, maintain buildings and serve our communities we can easily forget this. If the Christian life was just a set of rules to obey, religious acts to observe and an institution to maintain, it would not have lasted very long.

Trusting in the Holy Spirit to empower and lead is less safe than seeking to control events ourselves. Periodically in the history of the Church the Holy Spirit has broken through in ways that have upended our conventional way of doing things. It happened in the Wesleyan revival of the 18th century, numerous mini revivals in the church (some of which happened in our diocese) and in the great outpouring in Azusa Street in 1906 that gave birth to Pentecostalism. This is now the third largest stream in the Church today. In many ways it is hard to see how our current institutional predicament can be served by strategic thinking alone. I am praying for another (likely messy!) outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Diocese of Hereford. Only the Holy Spirit can give us the courage we need for the evangelistic challenge. Only the Holy Spirit can turn the hearts of those currently indifferent to Christian things to help see their need for the Lord. So, 'Come Holy Spirit and kindle the hearts of your people with the fire of your love'. Today, we need that more than ever.

ORLETON AND DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

THE ART OF FORAGING

On 26 March ODGC welcomed Liz Knight, one of the country's leading wild food experts. Liz, who lives in the Black Mountains, is an author

and runs foraging workshops and foraging walks. Although her subjects are known as wild, many grow in our own gardens. Liz brought plants with her and after describing their uses passed them to a club member, an able *sous chef*, to chop them for a salsa verde.

Dead nettles, red and white, are members of the mint family. Good for pollinators, they are rich in iron and vitamin C. An infusion of red nettle tea is warming and good for the circulation. Ancient Greeks used stinging nettles as a cure for many ills including arthritis, eczema and prostate problems. An infusion in water has a floral taste. They are high in protein and rich in iron, calcium, vitamin C, iodine and serotonin. A nettle omelette will provide all one's nutritional requirements. In Turkey they are rolled to neutralise the stings and eaten raw with olive oil and lemon.

Cleavers, or goosegrass, is a member of the coffee family and supports immunity by ridding the body of toxins. Infused in water it makes an excellent skin toner, nature's botox.

Hardy camellia flowers are edible and camellia oil tastes delicious. Magnolia buds and flowers are also edible, the buds tasting of cardamom and the petals a mixture of cardamom and ginger. Happily one can have one's cake and eat it as the fading petals can be used after enjoying the tree in flower. Young leaves taste of lemongrass and may be stuffed with cream cheese as a base for canapes. Magnolia bark is used medicinally for anxiety.

March and April are the worst months for depression when the body is depleted of minerals and that is when these plants are at their best. Others include wild garlic and ground elder, the latter used and grown by the Romans and eaten as a soup in Scandinavia today. Liz urged caution when picking wild garlic to avoid confusing wild garlic leaves with the emerging leaves of wild arum and autumn crocus which are both toxic.

It is wasteful to pick more than is needed. The art of foraging is to pick a little at a time so that afterwards one cannot see where one has been.

His and hers

I know perfectly well that marriage is supposed to be about sharing. Once we are married, 'yours' and 'mine' cease to matter – we hold everything in common. "All that I have, I share with you", as the modern marriage service expresses it. But whoever wrote those marriage vows has clearly never had to share garden equipment.

We are a multiple-wheelbarrow and -bucket household. When we moved here we brought with us a stack of plain black plastic buckets and two standard grey metal builders' barrows. They were all indistinguishable from each other, so there was no question of 'his' and 'hers' – they were just to be shared.

You might have thought that an easy enough task. So answer me this: why was it that whenever I wanted a bucket or a barrow I found that every single blasted one was full of my other half's bits and pieces? One barrow might be loaded with fence-mending equipment, while the other contained spades, forks and rakes. One bucket would be full of twine, soft-tie and scissors, two more might contain stones picked out from a bed he was preparing, while several others would inevitably hold murky water in which offsets of unidentifiable plants lurked. It's not that I minded him using all the buckets and barrows. It was just that he never, ever emptied them when he'd finished.

To begin with I quietly removed his kit from a barrow or bucket when I needed one. Then I started to get cross about it and made pointed remarks. I even tried making a scene. Nothing made any difference. Finally, I'd had enough: I had to get my own equipment and find a way of stopping him using it. Experience had taught me that writing my name on things made no difference. So that is why, gentle reader, if you visit me while I'm gardening you'll find me wheeling a luminous pink wheelbarrow with matching buckets.

Prize Giving Day

I used to belong to group of tearaway young wine writers (oh yes) called The Octagon, in an effort to distinguish itself from the staid and boring Circle of Wine Writers to which every vinous scribbler belonged. There was no entry fee, and no meetings apart from one every year, when we rented a room in a London restaurant and each brought along a bottle of something unusual, interesting or just plain weird.

We also awarded prizes, mostly to fellow scribes (usually from the Circle) for their achievements during the year. They were rarely present, because we thought it best not invite them to the humiliating proceedings.

There was, for example the VC, bestowed for extreme laziness. Sometimes a PR for a drinks company would hand round a blurb extolling their client's excellence whilst completely ignoring the shortcomings, which any self-respecting journalist would have felt compelled to question. To gain the VC (*Vieille Corde* in French, 'Old Rope' in English) the winner would simply have to submit the unaltered blurb under their own name to their Editor and get paid handsomely for it. No work involved apart from copy and paste.

There was also the Octagon MUG, which I won once. On many freebie trips, especially those to a single big producer, we would be given a parting gift or goodie bag, emblazoned with the company's logo, to remind us where we'd been, in case we'd forgotten when it came to writing it up: a Bolly brolly perhaps, or a pair of socks (headscarf for the ladies). I came back from a trip to Chile with a pair of gold-painted spurs in my bag — this was before airport scanners — which seemed more toy-like than useful. It was of so little relevance to me, or to wine, or to writing, that it won the Most Useless Gift prize that year.

Then there was the Green Award for the most environmentally friendly writing, that is, for the one who most successfully recycled his or her own work during the year. Editors always wanted a piece on alcohol-free drinks in January, something on port just before Christmas, Pimms in summer, and so on. After a couple of years of this, you can imagine how tedious it gets. After ten years you lose the will to write, so sooner or later everybody has to go over old ground. The only saving grace is that readers (if they're still with you) won't remember what you've written before anyway. There was never any shortage of contenders, but one year Edmund Penning-Rowsell romped away with it.

He wasn't so much a champagne socialist as a claret communist: to the left of Marx, with an unrivalled knowledge of, interest in, and penchant for, red Bordeaux, particularly the more expensive kind. Trawling through his regular columns in the *Financial Times* we came across two that were exact copies, word for word: the same column, in other words, printed twice. It wasn't his fault, just some dozy sub-editor on a Friday afternoon, but it was impossible to beat and he won *summa cum laude*.

So if someone claims to be an award-winning writer, it may be as well to check what the award was for.




