FROM THE EDITOR'S CHAIR

Greetings to all our readers!

Judging by the excellent photos submitted by our readers, summer has got off to a good start this year. Let's hope it continues!

You may know from our previous editorials that RNIB recently discontinued the audio transcription service which allowed us to provide an audio version of *The Parishioner* to residents with sight problems. Commercial alternatives are available but, unfortunately, they are far too expensive to offer a solution in the long term. Hetty and I are absolutely committed to continuing this provision and we have been exploring ways of doing so that are affordable and sustainable.

This month we trialled producing the audio version of the newsletter ourselves using the Read Aloud feature on Microsoft Word alongside a Voice Recorder. Although we have succeeded in producing an audio transcript of the Summer 2025 newsletter, we have concluded that this approach is not viable in the long term because the procedure is far too convoluted and extremely time consuming.

All things considered, we now think that the best alternative is to recruit volunteers who are willing to read and record the newsletter on an occasional basis, using a mobile phone with a standard voice recording app. We hope to put a team together so that no individual is overburdened. We are grateful to those in the parish who have already offered to help in this way.

If you would be interested, whether as a reader or to co-ordinate the team, please email us at <u>newsletter@yarpole.org</u>. You won't need a recording studio, but access to a quiet room is essential.



Berry good fruit

Moorcourt Farm is once again providing us with fresh berries, and also fruit juice.

For those new to the area Moorcourt is a farm not far from us in North West Herefordshire where they grow the most beautiful fruit which they nurture from blossom to berry.

It is fruit as it is meant to taste and a world away from the supermarket offerings. The fruit season begins in mid-May with strawberries that are bursting with flavour. Raspberries and blueberries begin in mid-June and cherries are available from early July until late August. We have deliveries every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and if you would like to reserve some then do drop us a line or give us a ring as they do sell fast! This year Moorcourt have also started producing their own fruit juice. We are stocking their apple, apple and raspberry and sparkling apple juice. The Gallery Café also sells the Moorcourt juices and they have pronounced them "Delicious!", so much so that we have already had to order more in!

Annual Members' Meeting

Sandy and I recently attended a thoroughly enjoyable 80th birthday garden party for a fellow Yarpolian where we met some founder members of the Yarpole Wasp Appreciation Society (YWAS). I innocently enquired from some of the other guests, "What is the purpose of wasps – no-one seems to like them, and, in the summer, they are a particular nuisance?" To my surprise, wasps were vehemently defended by those present with assertive claims that they act as natural pest control by consuming

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The Bells in Yarpole Bell Tower

The oldest of the three bells in the bell tower was cast in the middle of the fifteenth century, followed by the second cast in 1605, and the third in 1652.

In 1968 an inspection confirmed that the bells had to be "dead hung" i.e. could be struck but not swung due to the dangerous nature of the structure suspending them and the discovery that one bell was cracked. The cost of repairs was deemed to be too high and so the bells were silent for the next three decades.

Dr Kenneth Marsh and his wife Joan Marsh J.P. lived in Plainsbook, Yarpole, the cottage in the low dip on the left between Bircher and the Cockgate Crossroads. They became the driving force of the Bell Committee to raise the money needed, estimated at £10,000 to recast the cracked bell and make safe the structures in the tower.

The money was raised, the cracked bell was recast, the internal structure was made safe, new ropes purchased, and the bells were rehung. In September 1996, The Bishop of Hereford dedicated the restored bells, and they were heard again in the village for the first time for over three decades.

Nora Barker who farmed with her husband Ernest at Lower House Farm, remembered the bells ringing when she came as a young bride to the farm, prior to them being silenced. When she heard the bells ringing for the first time since the refurbishment, she came up the church drive crying saying, "I never thought I would hear them again, thank you all." Both she and her husband are buried in the burial ground. Perhaps they can hear them still.



The stained-glass window on the right of the church porch depicts the bells ringing to the heavens and bottom right there is an inscription to Dr Marsh, who died in 1998. His ashes and those of his wife are in the Garden of Remembrance alongside the Bell Tower.

Leon Fentem

The Parishioner is sad to announce the death of Leon Fentem of Westbank, Green Lane, Yarpole. Leon came to live in the village more than 40 years ago with his wife, Joy, who predeceased him. He worked as a poultry specialist at Sun Valley Foods Ltd and lived into his late 90s. We extend our sympathy to his family and friends.

Creating Wildlife Field Margins

We have recently created wildlife field margins on two of our fields at Pound House, with the help and guidance of the Wye and Usk Foundation plus Dan Jones Agri. Contracting. One of the fields abuts the new wildlife project being created by Border Oak, which was mentioned in a previous edition of *The Parishioner*. The new field margins will complement that scheme very nicely by providing wildlife corridors across a larger area.



Our western field's hedge, which abuts the new wildlife project has a small brook running along the side. This takes water from the surrounding fields, and runs into the Ridgemoor Brook, via our Stoney Brook. An attenuation pool will be added halfway along the brook in our field, to help with control of winter rain flows. The photo on the left was taken halfway along the field margin which contains our brook, looking south.

Over two hundred and forty trees have now been planted in the new field margins to help overall control and drainage in this catchment area. The tree whips include oak, beech, copper beech, hornbeam, goat willow and cricket bat willow, field maple, cherry, rowan and lombard poplar etc. The majority seem to have taken but all the cricket bat willows are struggling because at the time of writing it has hardly rained at all since they were planted at the beginning of April. This was the soonest we could get onto the fields after all the wet weather we had earlier in the year. It's a tricky business planting trees now that our seasons are so variable, either too wet or too dry! Perhaps it's always been so, but now it seems even more so.

The photo on the right was taken halfway along the second field margin looking east, towards where it connects to the other field margins at the far end.

You may just spot on the photos a good number of buttercups showing in the new field margins. We are happy to say that over May the number increased dramatically. The new margins are therefore already providing nectar, and the new trees will hopefully go on to provide berries etc. as they develop next spring, just when the birds need them most.

We think of it as the "new form of strip farming" something that can be passed from generation to generation to protect, maintain and cherish.

Unless you go by the meteorological calendar of course, in which case it is already here. Today I have decided to recommend some fiction books that I read over recent months and



really enjoyed. Hopefully they will appeal to you too. Have a lovely summer!

When Christ and His Saints Slept by Sharon Penman - Sharon Penman is one of my favourite historical fiction authors, and this book is a fantastic example of why I hold her in such high regard. Set largely in England in the middle of the 12th century, it covers the period known as the Anarchy, a brutal and bloody civil war for the throne fought between the Empress Matilda and her cousin, King Stephen. Penman's books are always well researched, and she uses said research to great effect here, creating a story that is both historically accurate and utterly gripping to read. It is one of those books you will read for fun but end up learning a great deal from. She also avoids falling into the trap of portraying the main characters as wholly good or wholly bad, instead presenting them as complex human beings who think they are acting for the greater good but instead plunge the entire country into chaos. If you have never read any of Penman's books before, this would be a fantastic place to start. It is long but totally worth the time.

The Turn of the Key by Ruth Ware - This creepy thriller sees a young woman take a job as a nanny at a remote "smart" house in the Scottish Highlands, only to later find herself in prison on a murder charge. So what went wrong? You will have to read it for yourself and find out! Although I'm mainly a reader of historical fiction, I do like a good thriller every now and then, and this one is particularly suspenseful. With more than a passing similarity to the classic chiller, The Turn of the Screw, this has all the ingredients needed to keep you glued to the pages as you try to work out what might be going on. Is our narrator going mad? Is the house haunted? Or is something else afoot? With plenty of twists and turns to keep you guessing, some of which you will not see coming, this is a perfect read for the summer, or any other time of year really. The Scottish Highland setting is an added bonus, as it adds a whole other layer of tension and unease to the proceedings.

The North Water by Ian McGuire - In 1850s England, a whaling ship sets sail for the Arctic, only to discover they have a violent, psychopathic killer onboard. What's more, we know who he is, as it's made clear to us from very early on. But how long will it take for the other crew members to work out the identity of this dangerous individual? As you will probably have already gathered, this is an incredibly dark book and therefore won't be for everyone. Because the killer is one of the point-of-view characters, we spend a fair amount of time in his company, which is not the nicest place to be. McGuire also doesn't shy away from showing you the reality of life onboard a 19th century ship, which was far from pleasant. However, there is a whole lot more to it than that, as it proves to be not only a fascinating character study, but a gripping historical thriller as well. If it sounds like the sort of thing you might be interested in reading, please do give it a try. It is dark, but it is satisfying.

Leominster Food Bank

We have been experiencing extremely busy times during the first quarter of this year. We hoped the cost-of-living crisis might be receding by this point, but this is not reflected in the numbers of people we are seeing, or the experiences people in difficulty are sharing with us.

By early May we had already distributed more than 1,000 food parcels to people in Leominster and its surrounds, of which over 500 were for children.

In January of this year, we had to move to much smaller premises while building work was being carried out at the Old Priory. We hoped this would be very short term, but we are still unable to return and anticipate a long wait, so we are now considering alternatives. This has increased our costs as we are giving some food parcels via supermarket vouchers to reduce the number of food bags we transport across town.

We now shop for the majority of our food items, topping up with food donated to us. This means that we have become increasingly appreciative of the generosity of our regular givers, because this consistent monthly income affords us some security in which to plan and weather the storms of ever-increasing food poverty.



Yarpole Group Parish Council

Firstly, an apology to The John Greene Foundation for misspelling its name in a previous edition. The Foundation funded the installation of the defibrillator at Lucton.

At the time of writing there is still a vacancy on the Parish Council, to be filled by co-option at the meeting on 1 July or thereafter. If you are interested in applying, please contact the Clerk, Mrs Maggie Brown, clerk@yarpolegroupparishcouncil.gov.uk 07398 222310 .

There were no members of public at the June meeting. Ward Councillor Dan Hurcomb was present and gave an informative report.

The Council agreed to renew its insurance with Zurich for another 3-year term. The annual premium is £460.45, including a £32 discount. This may change if Parish Council assets increase.

A 50% deposit of £588 has been paid for a new notice board, matching those at Bircher Common and Lucton, to be installed at Bircher. One side will be lockable for Council use, the other open to the public.

The gate at The Community Meadow is now left open, locked to the fence on a temporary basis until a new gatepost is installed. Grids removed during the car park upgrade will be kept for potential re-use. A "No Parking – Passing Place Only" sign will be purchased, and child safety signage is being considered. The Council cannot install signs on the highway without Herefordshire Council's approval.

Recent purchases include litter-picking tools and "YGPC Volunteer" high-vis vests for community use.

Two planning applications were reviewed. The first, at Pound House for a P251464/PA4 - (Part 3) Class Q - Prior Approval for a proposed change of use of agricultural buildings and land within their curtilage to form one smaller dwellinghouse and two larger dwellinghouses. Councillors raised concerns relating to surface and foul drainage, access to the site, the lack of gardens shown on plans, and the proximity to a Grade II Listed building. As it lies within the Lugg Catchment area, the Council has requested confirmation that environmental impacts will be assessed.

The second, <u>P251404/PA7 - All others - Prior Approval</u> at Home Farm, Croft, for proposed demolition of four redundant farm buildings. As comments were not being accepted, none were submitted.

The Tree Warden provided a second report on damage to a hedgerow near Public Right of Way YP14. Councillors are disappointed that Herefordshire Council has not enforced its reinstatement, despite a replant notice issued in April 2018, which was expected to provide 30 years of protection.

Come along to the next meeting on **1 July 7.00pm** at the Parish Hall. As there is no scheduled August meeting, this will be the last opportunity before **Tuesday 2 September**, followed by **7 October** and **4 November**.



News from our County Councillor

By the time I write another column for the Parishioner the summer will most likely have been and gone given the August hiatus. So I want to start by thanking all those involved in making the magazine happen — it really is a special thing and without the countless hours you give up to make it work it simply would not exist.


In May the County Council published its Q4 results and end of year accounts for the 2024/25 financial year. Despite the strong financial headwinds (including high inflation) the Council managed to deliver under budget by £0.5m. This strong performance is in contrast to large overspends in previous years and shows that the measures taken to control budgets and ensure value for money are working. The Council is, however, no different from a large number of households across the country in that it is having to make the money it has go much further than ever before. For us the next big test is the government spending review (published in June) which will determine our budgets for the short and medium term. Let us hope it is kinder to us than in previous years.

You may have read in recent news that Phase 1 of the Hereford Western Bypass is progressing with funding allocated and discussions taking place around the appointment of a contractor. Whichever side of the bypass debate you are on, the government housing targets for Herefordshire (30,000 new homes) mean that the bypass and the development space this will unlock are essential. If the project does not happen, then some 12-15,000 homes will instead have to be distributed across the county including in villages like Yarpole, Luston, Orleton and Kingsland. To me this is unacceptable and further strengthens the case for the bypass.

In happier news, it seems that not a month passes by without there being more highways resurfacing news and long may it continue. As I write this the B4362 at Comberton is being worked on and the B4362 between Yarpole and Lucton has been marked up by the Highways Team in preparation for works later in the year. These works will be a combination of resurfacing and large-scale patching where appropriate. I am trying to expand this to include the Mortimer's Cross junction to Lucton, but this will be very much budget-dependent.

On a final note, we are lucky in Bircher Ward to have three local shops (one community owned), seven local pubs (two community owned) and a local community run café. However, with rising costs making it increasingly difficult to run a business, they now need our support more than ever. So please, where you can, make it your mission to support these businesses.

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

It's Not Time for Bed Yet!

On 27 May we welcomed Helen Picton who is a proprietor of Old Court Nurseries and Picton Garden, Colwall, a family business established in 1906. The 1.5-acre garden holds the Plant Heritage National Collection of michaelmas daisies. The total area of nursery and garden is 2.5 acres.

Although the stars of the garden are the 430 varieties of michaelmas daisies, which peak between late September and mid-October, Helen - aided by a colourful slideshow - stressed the importance of colour throughout the year beginning with a wonderful display of 300 varieties of snowdrops.

Entering the garden in late summer the visitor is greeted by the glowing spikes of kniphofia rooperi followed by the later flowering yellow K. 'Happy Halloween'. The path winds through a former rockery occupied by acer palmatum and pines and underplanted with late crocosmias, Japanese anemones and heleniums. Moving into mixed herbaceous borders, bright yellow swathes of golden rod contrast with pastel asters. Solidago rugosa 'lowa' is a dainty and restrained example, untroubled by mildew.

Height is provided by the white bottlebrushes of sanguisorba canadensis and white daisies of doellingeria umbellatus which also provide winter interest as does the shrublike aster, symphyotrichum horizontalis. White spikes of actaea add height and scent.

Small trees - Japanese acers, crataegus prunifolia and euonymus compactus provide autumn colour. Ferns flourish in the shadier areas. Polypodium is dormant in summer producing its fresh green leaves in early autumn and retaining these throughout winter. Grasses also provide winter interest though space is needed to accommodate miscanthus transmorrisonensis!

The stars of the garden are not forgotten. Aster frikartii 'Monch' blooms from July to November, symphyotrichum ericoides 'Snow Flurry' provides clouds of daisies into November and deep violet aster triverius will bloom from October to Christmas, after which it is time for the snowdrops to return.

THE CURIOUS GARDENER

The Thrill of the Chase

I have a dark secret. I hesitate to share it in such a public way for fear it makes you think worse of me, but I feel it's time you knew. I am not the upright, clean-living soul you may have believed me to be; at night in the summer I become a ruthless killer. What is worse, I enjoy it.

I wait till it's completely dark. By this point my other half is snoozing, dreaming innocent dreams on the sofa. I tiptoe out of the room so as not to disturb him, pick up a torch and slip outside into the darkness. Then the fun begins. I work my way round the garden, searching out my prey: slugs and snails.

They come in all shapes and sizes, depending on the plant that they're destroying. The bigger, more leathery Hostas seem to attract the largest snails, while my soft, golden-leafed Hosta is home to the tiniest newborns. I find giant slugs on my Aconitums (last year in the wet summer I found more than 40 on one plant in a single evening), while the sweet peas attract baby slugs so small that I can't see them without my glasses. But regardless of whether they are fully-grown grandparents or wet-behind-the-ears hatchlings, all that I find are doomed.

If you don't want to know the gory details, stop reading now. I grab hold of the offender, drop it onto a hard surface, lift my foot, and — well, the sound depends on whether it's a slug or a snail, but the end result is the same. One fewer mollusc, another plant saved for one evening at least.

There's something very calming about spending an hour in this way. The only disadvantage is the amount of mucus coating my hand by the time I've finished. It's very difficult to wash off, but I've discovered that a spoonful of salt rubbed between my fingers removes the slime very effectively. Since a snail can lay up to 100 eggs at once, and a slug can produce 500, there's not much danger of my garden becoming mollusc-free. Perhaps in a future life the slugs and snails I've slaughtered will come back as frogs or thrushes, hunting molluscs in someone's garden. I only hope I don't come back as one of the slugs.

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
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Crib Festival

On the afternoon of Sunday 30 November, we will have an Advent and Christingle service combined.


