CHURCH MATTERS



Today I was at a funeral as part of my role as a Churchwarden. During the service, members of the deceased's family spoke about him and different aspects of his life and personality.

Reflecting on this afterwards, I thought about how, during our lives, we meet and get to know many people and they us. If we were to ask these people to describe who we are, it is likely that there would be different descriptions of us from different people. Some people may know us very well, whilst others will only know us on a superficial level. We are all complex beings with complex personalities and we present differently depending on who we are with and the circumstances. It is unlikely that anyone knows all aspects of who we are.

God however knows us in our entirety, warts and all, down to our last atom. Yet in spite of God knowing all our failings and weaknesses, H e still loves us unconditionally. This is pretty amazing.

It would be nice if we could feel that way too about others. We may know things about a person that we don't like, but it would be good if we could remember that what we see of a person may be only one aspect of who they are. We don't know why someone behaves the way that they do, and we don't know what good lies beneath the surface.

In St. Luke's Gospel chapter 23:39-43 is the story of the penitent thief. Those who crucified him saw a bad person, who deserved to die, but Jesus sees a different side to this man. The thief rebukes the other thief who is crucified, for mocking Jesus. He says that they deserve to be punished for their sins, but that Jesus has done nothing wrong. The good thief asks Jesus to remember him, Jesus responds by telling him that he will join Jesus in Paradise.

Jesus was able to recognise that this man was more than just a thief, he had good in him. We too should try to see the good in others.

So true! So said one of the many visitors to St. Leonard's during the very successful vintage car rally in July. The event itself was a marvellous spectacle and a celebration of vintage cars from generations past. Many of the visitors commented that it was their first visit to Yarpole but not their last! A big thank you goes out to Jackie and her incredible Gallery Café team for their dedication and endeavour during the very hectic service.

SLM has invested in an industrial-quality aluminium scaffolding tower with a maximum working height of 6.2m (20 ft). (See separate image on next page). It will be used by contractors and volunteers in carrying out necessary repairs to the church and Grade 1 Bell Tower. For example, exterior repointing of the eastern end of the church is planned soon, followed by the replastering of the interior walls behind the altar. Furthermore, Chris Howell has kindly offered to repair our beautiful hanging murals so that they continue to celebrate the outstanding conversion of the church in 2010. It is SLM's intention to make this scaffolding tower available to community groups and private individuals in the parish for other repair work to community buildings and private dwellings. Trustees are just discussing this idea with our insurers so that any potential issues of liability and safety are fully covered. We will update you in due course.

The Gallery Café continues to receive plaudits for the quality of the setting, the tasty goodies on offer and the lovely atmosphere that is created daily by our volunteers. There has been, for some time, an identified need to update and extend the preparation and serving area so that Jackie and our valued volunteers have a workable and safe environment, particularly when preparing and serving lunches and brunches on Thursdays to Saturdays. A working group has been set up to extend, redesign and refit the whole Gallery Café preparation and serving area. This project will require significant funds so an application to the National Lottery Community Fund is planned. If you know of anyone with an interest and experience of seeking such funding and who could advise the trustees accordingly, please contact me. SLM trustees are delighted to welcome Tim Ware and Jeff Woodfield to our 'back-room team'. Tim will be supporting trustee Stefano Street on all matters relating to buildings and maintenance and Jeff has kindly offered his enormous experience in working with heritage buildings so that trustees receive informed advice on contract procurement and best value for money.

Finally, a really big thank you to the PCC for its generous contribution of £2,000 as well as an anonymous donation of £500 towards the cost of our very popular automated doors system.

Yarpole Group Parish Council

This update includes information from and after the last meeting on 1 July. A new Councillor, Sam Colledge, was co-opted in July and warmly welcomed by the Parish Council (YGPC).

It was noted that funding for Neighbourhood Development Plans (NDP) has been withdrawn, and it was agreed to write to Ellie Chowns MP and the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government (Angela Rayner MP), highlighting the need for long-term funding support.

A new notice board has been purchased for Bircher. Thanks are due to two residents who helped Cllr Cadwallader with its installation. Thanks are also recorded to a resident who has looked after the Yarpole board for many years. The baton has now been passed to another generous volunteer. Thanks also to a resident who has recently swept up Yew leaves on Green Lane.

YGPC considered the problem of ruts in the grass at the junction of Green Lane and Brook Lane and a product which might resolve the issue. It was agreed to wait until after the anticipated development at Brook House Farm is completed. Please do not park opposite this junction – it forces large vehicles to mount the kerb when turning in or out.

The condition of the white railings along the C1039 was discussed. Since the meeting, Cllr Hill met the Locality Steward and considered riparian responsibilities, erosion of the banks (undercutting the highway) and the stability of the posts and rails. The Steward also looked at hedges, some of which are overhanging the pavement impeding access for pedestrians, particularly those with mobility scooters or pushchairs.

Following a road traffic accident, oil absorption pads and a boom were left in the stream near Mulberry Meadow. The Environment Agency arranged for their removal. The situation was monitored by Cllr Hill, who also helped by moving the pads to the bank, as instructed.

Herefordshire Council's Traffic Management team has approved the installation of "Children Playing" signage near the Community Meadow; costs are to be discussed in September. A proposal for a gazebo, included in the original plans for the Meadow, remains under consideration. YGPC has asked whether planning permission is required. It was agreed to have woodchip under benches/tables removed. A more effective solution will be implemented in due course.

Cllr Di Hill and two Yarpole residents attended a joint meeting with the Luston Flood Group on 30 June with a view to working collaboratively on problems affecting both parishes.

YGPC agreed to arrange weed spraying along both kerbed sections of Green Lane and at the entrance to Croft Crescent. The road was swept in August.

Several Planning Applications were discussed at the July meeting. No objections were raised to three applications, and comments were submitted regarding P251683/V - Certificate of Lawfulness (CLOPD) at Homelea, Bircher. Further details are available in the Minutes, and on Herefordshire Council's website.

Residents are welcomed at Parish Council meetings – upcoming dates are Tuesday 2 Sep, followed by 7 Oct, 4 Nov, and 2 Dec, all at 7pm at the Parish Hall.

News from our County Councillor

It has been two months since I last wrote a column for the Parishioner and I'm glad over that time we have managed to enjoy a proper summer (even if we could have done with a little more rain!). I have tried to use the summer to attend as many events as possible and to get out and about to see those residents who have contacted me on various issues.

Over the summer, I have had reports locally of dogs barking at a frequency which is disturbing some local residents so please can I remind all those with four-legged friends that they should be mindful of their neighbours and try to ensure that dogs are not left to bark for long periods of time. I know this can be difficult at times but hopefully by mentioning it here we can avoid the need for action to be taken by Herefordshire Council.

In my June piece I mentioned that work was planned on the B4362 between Cockgate and Yarpole. I am pleased to see the signs have gone up confirming this is to take place in September and, subject to any last minute changes, the work will occur between 8 – 19 September. I have used this opportunity to restate the case for a 40mph speed limit through Cockgate and an extension of the 30mph from the Village up to the Village Hall. In addition, I have also restated the case for a reduction of the 50mph down to 40mph at Lucton. I am pleased to say that Herefordshire Council have reacted positively to both requests and following a site meeting with the relevant officer a formal consultation on the speed reductions will follow. Whilst this process will not conclude before the work is completed, provision will be made for any material changes required in either location to facilitate the speed reductions. I have everything crossed that by the end of the year new speed limits will be in place and I thank all those residents who have taken the time to write to me or meet with me to discuss the speed reductions.

Whilst the Parish Council does not meet in August, when they return in September they will be discussing ditching, drainage and Public Rights of Way work. So, if you know of any area that may need a gate/stile repairing or additional drainage work/ditching please do get in touch. A What3Words location is always helpful (and if you haven't used W3W before then please google it, it's a really useful tool).

As always if you have any concerns, issues or would just like a chat then please do get in touch.





Stream Care - A Riparian Responsibility


If you own land adjoining a stream, you are a *riparian owner*. This means you are responsible for maintaining the banks and ensuring the water flows freely. Keeping vegetation managed and removing obstructions helps prevent flooding, protects wildlife, and maintains water quality.

Hedge Trimming – Keep Pavements Safe

Overgrown hedges can block pavements, making it difficult for pedestrians, wheelchair users, and those with pushchairs to pass safely. Please check your boundaries and cut back any overhanging growth to ensure clear access for all.

Bird Nesting Season:

This typically runs from March to August, so avoid cutting hedges, during this period to protect nesting birds and comply with the law.



Late Summer/Early Autumn:

This is a good time for a more substantial trim, particularly for hedges that have experienced vigorous growth during the summer. Remember they grow fast, I would say perhaps take them back slightly further than your boundary to allow for that



News from the Leominster Area Branch

Wildlife Passages: Riverside Wildlife

Leominster Area Branch was asked to contribute some information for the Leominster in Bloom portfolio on Wildlife passages. Here is an extended report from Rupert Gulley on riverside wildlife:

Along the Lugg the most interesting bird I've seen is the elusive dipper, which has also been spotted on the Kenwater in the heart of Leominster. Other birds to look out for on the Lugg are the grey wagtail, goosander, grey heron and little egret. Mallards, coots and moorhen are reasonably common along the Lugg near Leominster. If you are observant you are quite likely to see a kingfisher darting along the river and increasingly great white egrets can be seen rising up from the river margins. Large numbers of swans and geese will congregate on the wet fields near the Lugg especially after flooding. In the summer you will get large numbers of sand martins around the Lugg on the wilder bits a mile or so south of Leominster, buzzards and red kites are regularly seen soaring near the Lugg above the surrounding fields. Swallows are also here but unfortunately not in large numbers anymore. Otters can be spotted right in the centre of Leominster on the river.

The river Arrow which loops to the south of Leominster and feeds the Lugg supports interesting birds as it winds through less intensively cultivated land and benefits from local farmer Ben Andrew's concern for the environment. One of the highlights is the Redstart, which can be seen in the summer. In the winter flooding I've seen snipe, short-eared owl and many types of duck. A highlight for me was coming face to face with an otter!

Herons, egrets and birds of prey, especially kestrels are also seen regularly. Another highlight on the approaches to the Arrow are the skylarks, which trill over the surrounding fields. Corn Bunting, very rare in Herefordshire, have been spotted on hedgerow close to the river and warblers of many stripes are all over. I view the Arrow floodplain as a hidden gem, which must be protected especially within the potential Leominster Southern development.

In July Orleton and District Gardening Club held their AGM and a successful bring and share meal with delicious contributions from members.

On Tuesday 30th September Phillip Aubury will be presenting a demonstration of 'Propagation from Seeds, Cuttings and Division'. Philip began and concluded his horticultural career at the Birmingham Botanical Gardens where he was responsible for many innovations and improvements until his retirement in 2007. In between he trained, worked in and managed retail nurseries and was a lectururer and so is extremely experienced and knowledgeable.


Wild flower meadows update

It's been two years since a band of Yarpolians helped us sow wild flower seeds in three of our fields adjoining Welshman's Lane. As part of the project we carry out a meadow survey each year to see what is growing. We send the results to Herefordshire Meadows, the charity that is supporting us, so that they can keep tabs on how well the restoration of the fields is progressing.

Last year was the first survey we carried out since the seeds were sown and we found that 16 species had made an appearance. This year the number of species has increased to 23. What is really interesting is that some new species have sprung up around the margins of the fields where we didn't actually sow any seeds. These new species include pignut, meadow vetchling, golden saxifrage, tormentil and meadowsweet. This suggests that perhaps the plants were there all the time but were constantly being grazed off so we never saw them. Removing the sheep during the summer months has allowed them to flower, perhaps for the first time in years.

What's also really pleasing is how the clumps of wild flowers are spreading. The patches are much bigger than last year, and in places are starting to make quite an impact. Of course it's early days, and there are still wide expanses of ground with nothing but grass. There's also variation between the fields: the top field by the road seems to be the slowest to get established, while the bottom field is racing ahead. There's a footpath through that bottom field (path YP19). By the time you read this it will be too late to see any flowers, but next year, if you'd like to see for yourself what's growing, do take a walk through the meadow.

Voices from the Village: Eddie Hughes

Many of you will recognise the familiar face of Eddie Hughes, making his way down to the shop to pick up his paper at 9 o'clock each day. What you might not know is that, at nearly 90 years of age, Eddie is one of Yarpole's oldest and longest residents.

Born in nearby Leintwardine, in 1935, Eddie, one of 10 children, went first to Caynham Primary School and then to Ludlow Secondary Modern (now the Mascall Centre). On leaving school, he followed his father into farm work, on George Cadwallader's farm on Bircher. Aged 18, he was called up for National Service and spent three years in the RAF, before returning home to work at Wooferton sawmill. A fanatical footballer and cricketer, Eddie has numerous trophies in his lounge cupboard as marks of his prowess on the field.

Following his marriage to Maureen, at Eye church, they moved, in November 1959, to Yarpole, first to Tudor House (then divided into two properties) and then to a newly-built council house in James Close, where he still lives today. "There was no mains water here then," he recalls. "There was a well at number 4, which supplied all eight houses. You had a rotary pump in the kitchen, which pumped it into a tank in the attic. It took 25 minutes to fill the tank, so you didn't have many baths! The water was excellent though and supplied through lead pipes."

On leaving the sawmill, Eddie went on to work for Herefordshire County Council, eventually becoming a supervisor in the Highways Department. "At that time," says Eddie, "Green Lane was very narrow with just a few passing places. You had a job to get by. I supervised the widening of most of the road, but the council ran out of money before the work could be completed." (Nothing new there, then!) Apparently, there were also plans to build more council houses in Croft Crescent. This project was also stymied by the lack of funds.

"In the sixties," Eddie remembers, "there were two shops in the village, both general stores. One at the bottom of the village (lately occupied by Jill and Duncan Grant), and one opposite the Bell (now Steps Cottage)." The former also included the Post Office, and was the most used. Eddie remembers that "Bill and Annie Richards ran the Post Office and Annie used to deliver the post on a bike!" On his marriage, Eddie was tempted to buy one of the houses opposite the Post Office, going for a princely £500.

The Bell itself was then managed by Margaret and John Lewis, and was extremely popular, especially with the farmhands, of which there were many more in the sixties. "Sometimes, there were cars parked on Green Lane all the way from the Bell to James Close. If you didn't get there early on a Friday and Saturday night, you couldn't get in! They were drinkers then," says Eddie. "And no food was served." Eddie was captain of the Bell darts team, and won trophies for that, too.

Eddie bought his first car in 1960, a Ford Anglia. He remembers that the wipers used to stop when the car was going uphill. (*Continued on following page*).

"There were a lot fewer houses in the village, in those days," Eddie recalls. "None of the new bungalows had been built, and up Green Lane, there was only Pear Tree Cottage, where Mrs Dale lived, and the Old School House." Of course the school on the B4362 was open then and Old School House, was once the home of the schoolmaster. Eddie remembers the schoolchildren making their way up Green Lane and along the footpath and back, morning and afternoon.

There was a village hall in Yarpole, but, when the new village hall was built in 1989, Eddie remembers that "The old village hall was taken down in sections, bought by a farmer from Orleton and rebuilt as a farm shop!"

Asked what the biggest village event was, Eddie replied, "The Queen's Silver Jubilee, in 1977. The whole village came out for the event. A parade, with floats and drum majorettes, made its way from the village up to Croft Castle." Eddie decorated his blue Mini Pickup with flowers. Perched on the back were a mock Queen (who Eddie thinks might have been one of the Carpenter family from Bircher Common) and two Ladies-in-Waiting. Eddie showed me a penknife he had won on the day for coming first in the slow bike race. "The one who was last, won the race," he says. "We also had a race where you had to run 100 yards with a bale on your back." He explains that he only finished second because he wasn't wearing any shoes!

"We had a pig roast, that night," Eddie recalls, "at Lucton School. But it wasn't very successful because the pig wasn't properly cooked. Not many people stayed."

1977 was a red-letter year for Eddie, too, as he was able to buy his council house, for £3500!

"Back in the day," says Eddie. "You knew everybody, but now I wouldn't know the one quarter. Of course, then you knew everybody's business, as well! You couldn't get away with much then!"
