

Illegal dumping of toxic garden waste on Bircher Common

During mid-August, eight sheep died on Bircher Common and a considerable number were made ill. We believe this was due to poisoning, from eating garden waste which had been illegally dumped on the common.

The owner of the sheep had a vet carry out a postmortem and the conclusion based on evidence found in the stomach contents was that they had been poisoned from eating a shrub/small tree called Choke Cherry. The leaves contain cyanide.

Despite several very detailed searches on the common we have been unable to find any such plant growing on or close to the common. However, we found at least two piles of garden rubbish that had been dumped and hidden behind bushes with evidence that sheep had been eating it. We have no proof that this is the source of the poisoning, but the evidence suggest that this is quite likely what happened.

Not only has this incident caused the farmer many hundreds of pounds for each sheep's death, but also a considerable amount of stress.


We have requested that the National Trust place signs on each entrance to the common advising visitors that it is illegal to dump any rubbish on common land. We hope that this will deter transgressors and prevent any recurrence.



The Parable of the odd socks

This evening whilst I was desperately looking for inspiration for what I would write, I glanced down at my feet and noticed I was wearing odd socks. In my haste to get dressed ready to go to work this morning, I had inadvertently put on odd socks. My intention had been to put on a pair of matching socks, but I had made a mistake.

Reflecting on this I recognised that we often start off with the intention to do the right thing, but, in our haste, or due to lack of thought, we sometimes get things wrong. It reminds me that we are human and as such we are flawed imperfect beings, who often make mistakes.

Sometimes we do things that we know we probably shouldn't, but we go ahead anyway because we think we know best and then suffer the consequences when things don't work out as we hoped.

When this happens, it is easy for us to blame ourselves, feel guilty and bad about ourselves. However in spite of our failings and mistakes God continues to love us and forgive us. God knows that we are not perfect. We are God's children and as any parent forgives its child when it makes a mistake, so God forgives us.

Just as God is willing to forgive us, so we should forgive ourselves and each other when we make mistakes. We need to have compassion for ourselves as through that compassion we will learn to have compassion for others.

Dear Lord, help us to recognise when we have got things wrong,

help us to recognise our failings and sins and to seek your forgiveness.

Help us to learn from our mistakes and to find it in our hearts to accept your forgiveness by forgiving ourselves.

Every season is special, and after a hot, dry summer, the changing colours of autumn bring a sense of calmer, cosier days and, hopefully, more time to curl up with a good magazine or book in front of a log fire. What better magazine to read than *The Parishioner*? - so let us not forget the significant efforts and time needed to draw in the enormous range of articles, group information pages and adverts for local businesses and trades. So, a big thank you to Lynne and Hetty for their diligence and endeavour in editing our excellent village magazine.

Our new scaffolding tower is already earning its keep; the external walls of the chancel have been repointed, eliminating damp to the interior walls. The crumbling plaster at the altar end of the church is being replaced and our beautiful colourful banners are now clean and repaired. Whilst our team of volunteers were using the tower we were able to change 20+ LED bulbs on the chandeliers above the nave and the Gallery Café.

The working group is looking at a total refit and extension of the Gallery Café kitchen and prep area. We continue to work with craftsmen to create a more useful and efficient space for Jackie and her team of volunteers to serve drinks, cakes and lunches. The high-quality balustrade that defines the Gallery Café will be extended to the area above the WCs and vestry creating a safer and better storage space for the café and church

The 'It's Only a Shed' project looks to be reaching a happy conclusion with the siting of a storage shed at the side of the church near the heat pumps. This simple project became an epic saga as we had to apply for planning permission since it will be sited in the village conservation area. We had to present evidence to show that it would not affect local biodiversity as well as jump through numerous hoops presented to us by the church authorities in order to gain permission from the church Chancellor. We rose to the challenge and soon the spare tables and chairs - as well as the scaffold tower - will be stored in our new shed.

Finally, SLM trustees, the village shop board and the PCC are working more closely together to seek ways of sharing expertise and keeping costs down. For example, our insurance company has advised on how we can ensure that any approved volunteers undertaking tasks for the church and SLM are covered by our policy. A more mutualistic relationship should benefit everyone.

Enjoy your autumn evenings cosying up by the fire!

Buses Update

In September, Yeoman's Travel took over more bus services, including ones serving Bircher and Yarpole: 492 Ludlow/Leominster, 489 Wigmore/Leominster and 498 Leintwardine/Hereford.

There are some changes:

- On Tuesdays and Fridays, the 489 bus into Leominster now calls at Yarpole, St Leonards at 9.56 (previously 9.11).
- On Wednesdays, the 498 service passes through Yarpole at 9:51 and returns from Hereford at 13:35 from the Maylord Orchards stop.
- Changes to the 492 timetable mean that the following buses now pass through Yarpole.
 - To Leominster at 7.53 (Mon to Fri) and 13.43 (Mon to Sat).
 - To Ludlow at 8.44 (Sat only), 10.44 (Mon to Fri) and 14.49 (Mon to Fri).

A trip to Ludlow is now possible Monday to Friday, leaving Yarpole at 10.44 and returning from the Assembly Rooms at 13.15. Also, numerous buses pass through Bircher Turn in both directions.

One member of the public and the Tree Warden attended the last meeting on 2 September.

Thanks were recorded to residents of **Bircher** who helped Cllr Cadwallader install the new notice board and the **Men's Shed Group** for the refurbishment of road signs. It all looks very smart!

Stream by the C1039. Assessment of bank stability and advice on the wall (east-side) is expected following a meeting with the Locality Steward. See *Your watercourse – rights and roles* on the Parish Council website under The Parish/Useful Information. The Environment Agency (with help from ClIr Hill) removed absorbent pads used to clear up oil spilled into the watercourse during a road traffic accident.

Balfour Beatty has installed a new chevron sign near Mulberry Meadow, and Passing Place signs have been installed by the Parish Council, in Church Road **Lucton**, and by the Community Meadow. A notice asking drivers to use the village car park rather than parking opposite the Green Lane/Brook Lane junction is to be put up. Whether the 30mph sign (near Mulberry Meadow) can be moved further out of the village will be questioned.

Balfour Beatty will be asked what action has been taken regarding a fence installed on the west side of the C1039, and for the mowing schedule for the verge at Mulberry Meadow.

Councillors agreed to speak informally with householders if hedges are obstructing pavements/highways. If needed, the Parish Council may send a polite follow-up letter. The aim is to ensure safe passage for all pedestrians. The clerk can provide contractor details for hedge cutting if required.

A bench will be purchased to be placed outside the graveyard in **Lucton** and the existing plaque will be transferred.

Obstructions on Public Right of Way LK5 will be reported to Herefordshire Council. A stile on the YP36 near The Knoll will be replaced with a metal gate. **Orleton Footpath Maintenance Volunteers** have offered to install it, for which they are thanked. Residents are encouraged to report issues to the **Parish Footpaths Officer**, David Teale 01568 780 613/07973 195062 davidteale@email.com, or to the clerk.

The first draft of the 2026/27 budget will be discussed in October. Input from residents is welcomed.

How Conservation Areas affect planning was queried. The recent sweeping of Green Lane was discussed, and whether it is necessary to spray weeds along the kerb. Road sweeping will be discussed again in October to enable residents to comment, and to determine the most appropriate time of year for such work. In addition, the problem of potholes at Green Lane Crescent was raised.

Residents are welcomed at Parish Council meetings. Upcoming dates are **Tuesday 7 October**, followed by **4 November**, and **2 December**, all at 7pm at the Parish Hall.

The leaf fall can make pavements dangerous and lead to blocked drains and gullies, so if you do see anything locally then please let me know so it can be reported to Herefordshire Council.

I'd like to take a moment to thank Balfour Beatty for replacing some of the damaged concrete posts at the end of the village. This was long overdue and although there is more to do to paint and refurbish the railings in that area, it is a good start. Equal thanks are due to the Parish Council for raising the problem and for also highlighting the state of the hazard sign on the bend by Mulberry Meadow. I am pleased to report this has also been replaced recently.

I know there has been lots of talk locally about Conservation Areas and what protection they actually provide from a planning perspective. I am working to encourage the council to provide better guidance on their website and directly to Parish Councils to ensure that everyone understands what they are and how they work better. I am always happy to help where I can on planning matters, so please do get in touch.

In last month's column I wrote about the Highways work on the B4362 at Cockgate and by the time of publication that should have been completed successfully. A late addition to the programme also means that part of Green Lane by the village hall will be resurfaced and I am trying to secure some work at the edge of the village hall car park at the same time. (I hope by the time you read this that has happened!)

On a final note, this will be the last issue I write for before Bonfire night, so I'd just like to remind residents who are planning on having fireworks to be considerate of neighbours and their pets. It's good practice to let everyone know when you will be doing it so they can make the appropriate arrangements. If you like fireworks but can't be bothered with the hassle, then you can always attend the Orleton Young Farmers Bonfire & Fireworks which is held on the 5 November in Orleton and raises funds for local charities each year.





The Curious Gardener: A lesson learned

What could be nicer on a sweltering day than to cool off in a pool? Imagine perching on the edge with your legs dangling in the water, then slipping gently into the depths and savouring the caress of water on your hot skin – delicious. Except this wasn't a swimming pool: it was our garden pond, and 'delicious' is not the word I would use to describe the experience.

The problem had been apparent for a couple of years, but I'd been pretending not to notice. It all started with a visit to a water garden centre to choose a water lily. The lilies were displayed according to size, and right at the end of the tank was a section marked 'miniature, suitable for sinks and tubs'. Our pond is small — not much more than 7 feet across — but it's still considerably bigger than a sink or tub, so we thought we'd have room for two of these dainty miniatures. We brought them home and put them at the bottom of the pond.

24 hours later we were astonished to see that the stems of these lilies had grown remarkably quickly and were now proudly displaying leaves on the water's surface. If we'd had our wits about us we would have realised straight away that these were no pygmy lilies. One year on, the surface of the pond was obliterated by lily pads. I should have acted then, but as they were flowering it seemed a shame to disturb them. Silly me. This summer, having filled the entire pond with their spreading roots, they began climbing out of the water. I couldn't leave it any longer: I had to take action.

I put on a pair of old shoes, tucked my skirt into my undies and got into the pond. The water was clogged with lilies to the point where I could barely move through it, and my feet disappeared into a thick layer of slimy decaying matter. The lilies were so large and heavy that I couldn't shift them, so I attacked them bit by bit with a pruning saw, hacking off chunks so that I could heave them out of the pond and dump them on the side. Every part of me got splattered with black gunk, and I couldn't tell whether the smell was coming from the water or from me.

By the time I'd finished, the level of the pond had dropped a good foot: the lilies had taken up such a lot of space that there hadn't been much room left for water.



The lesson learned? Don't believe everything you read on the garden centre label. You may be in for a big surprise.



The Day I went to Cyprus

We could be forgiven for wondering, when a newspaper columnist gives a glowing report about a holiday hotel they are recommending, whether they have been nobbled. Having been flown out to stay in a five-star hotel on a tropical island for a long weekend by a travel company, they are not going to come back and say it's rubbish. So can we trust them when they talk it up as *the* place to spend our holiday?

It's the same with wine, when the writer has obviously been royally entertained: are they saying nice things about the wine in question because it would be rude to say anything else after all that generous hospitality? But if they say that 'despite all the freebies, actually it's not very good, so I wouldn't buy it if I were you,' then you might be inclined to trust their independence a bit more.

I mention this because I found myself in just such a situation once. The Department of Agriculture on the Greek part of Cyprus invited a colleague and me to visit one year: in time for the harvest at the end of August, when it was quite hot. Any later in Cyprus and the sugar in the grapes increases, upping the alcohol level, and acidity decreases, wiping out the freshness.

We tasted a few wines, which were less than impressive, and were eventually taken to a co-operative, where farmers from round about brought their fruit along for communal processing. It's normal throughout Europe, and there are some extremely good co-ops. It was around mid-day, and a line of tractors — each pulling a trailer piled high with grapes — waited patiently for their turn, whilst those at the front had their load weighed and assessed before it all went into the crusher. It was then immediately obvious what had been wrong with the wines we had been tasting.

Grapes need to be kept cool at all times otherwise all the delicate aromatic scents and flavours, along with the wine's freshness, will evaporate into thin air, and you will be left with just flabby boring fruitless juice that you wouldn't pay twopence for, which is what we had been tasting. Leaving them to boil in the mid-day sun on a trailer is the last thing that should happen to them.

So what should I write about when I got back home? I couldn't hide the poor winemaking practices, and I could hardly pretend I hadn't been, and write nothing at all. So I told it like it was, pointing out that just about every other wine region in the world had mastered the basics by now, and that if Cyprus wanted to sell its wines in the UK – the world's primary wine market – it would have to pull its socks up. I'm sorry, but as things stand couldn't recommend anything.

My article didn't go down well on the island. Shortly after it appeared the Department of Agriculture invited me back for re-education, since I had obviously got it all wrong. I didn't go and haven't dared to go back since: I don't want to get drowned in a barrel of plonk as a punishment. Happily, Cypriot wines are now made completely differently and have improved hugely over the past few years. *Now* they can invite journalists.

Hello everyone! Welcome to the latest edition of 'Lisa's Book Nook'. I hope you all had a lovely summer. As I sit writing this, the nights are drawing in and the days are getting colder. Autumn is here once again. With Halloween just around the corner, what better time for me to recommend some spooky reads to you all. I hope you enjoy them.



Hear Him Calling by Carly Reagon - The ever-dependable Carly Reagon makes a welcome return to my book nook with this chilling ghost story. Featuring a dual timeline, it centres upon Karl and Lydia Stein, a couple who move to a tower in a small village in Wales after Karl inherits the property from his grandfather. Lydia struggles with the isolation of the village and the unwelcoming attitudes of the locals, and things only get worse when strange occurrences begin happening around their new home. It isn't long before the dark history of the house begins making its way out into the open, just as winter kicks in. As with Reagon's previous offering, 'The Toll House', this is a deliciously creepy story that is just perfect for the dark nights ahead. It grips you from the very first page, covers a surprising number of topics for a relatively short book, and relies on tension and atmosphere to create scares rather than full-blown blood and gore. Grab yourself a blanket and a hot drink and snuggle up with this. You won't be disappointed.

Midnight is a Lonely Place by Barbara Erskine - For me, autumn is not complete without a Barbara Erskine book, and this is arguably one of the scariest in her extensive back catalogue. Biographer Kate Kennedy moves to an isolated cottage on the Essex coast to escape the fallout of a failed love affair. Initially, all seems well, but things start to go wrong after the discovery of an Ancient Roman site nearby. As the level of paranormal activity escalates and becomes increasingly malevolent, Kate begins to realise the cottage might not be the safe haven she thought it was. Something clearly went very wrong in the local area a couple of millennia before, but what exactly happened? What secrets lay buried that are desperate to come out? You will just have to read it for yourself and find out. This deeply satisfying, entertaining and creepy read will keep you turning the pages long into the night.

Witches: James I and the English Witch-Hunts by Tracy Borman - Halloween wouldn't be Halloween without witches, so although this excellent non-fiction book by acclaimed historian Tracy Borman is not scary in the traditional sense, it is still a great read for this time of year. It takes a look at a real-life incident that occurred at Belvoir Castle in 1613, when the heir of one of England's great noble families fell ill and died in mysterious circumstances. Other members of his family soon began to exhibit similar symptoms, and when his younger brother followed him to the grave a few years later, it wasn't long before the inevitable accusations of witchcraft began to raise their heads. Three women, Joan Flower and her daughters, Philippa and Margaret, found themselves blamed for the deaths, and were arrested and put on trial, although Joan would die before her trial could take place. The case caused a huge wave of hysteria and paranoia to break out across the country, fuelled in part by similar witch-hunts that were taking place across Europe at the time. But were the women actually guilty of murder and witchcraft, or were they simply guilty of being different in a time when non-conformity could result in danger to life? This is a beautifully written, extensively researched book about a fascinating and turbulent time in British history, and I think it is essential reading for anyone who is interested in the 17th century.
